CEDAR ISLAND ON FIRE

AND WAS IN DANGER OF BEING DESTROYED.

Blaze Discovered in Centre of Island—Robert McCorkill Alarmed the Campers, Who Fought the Fire for Some Hours.

Cedar Island had a narrow escape on Friday evening from being wiped out by fire. About dusk Robert McCorkill, a Kingston tailor, who was over near Cartwright's Point, noticed a blaze in the centre of the island. He immediately hurried over the intervening water in his boat, and taking a pail of water ran to the spot where the fire was burning. Seeing that the blaze was beyond the control of one man he went to the lower end of the island and alarmed the campers, who were unable to see the fire. In a very short time a fire-fighting force of twenty or twenty-five was at the scene battling with the burning grass and brush. When the grass on the hillside of Macdonald park in the city was so quickly burned over on Friday morning one can imagine what might have occurred on Cedar Island, with so much brush, had the fire got much of a headway. There would have been nothing but a wholesale destruction of the island, for every thing would have burned like tinder, so dry were the trees and brush after the hot spell. The campers worked for nearly three hours, pouring on water and tramping out the fire in new places. The blaze lit up the water for quite a distance around. The campers say that only for the action of Mr. McCorkill the island would have been destroyed. The opinion is that the fire was deliberately set, and the have suspicion of the guilty parties. The rain that came later in the night made things safe.

The occurrence is verified by Deputy Fire Chief Elmer.

The pole and flag to be presented to the city on civic holiday, for Victoria Park, are not from the Kingston Old Boys' Association of Toronto. The money was subscribed in Kingston, and the ladies of the upper part of the city are giving the flag. The impression was that the presentation was by the old boys of Toronto. Some years ago the old boys up there offered a flagpole to the city, but the city council that year turned down the offer, so it is alleged, although no one here knew that an offer had been formally made to the council.

Oiling of the Streets.

Complaint is made at the frequent dust arising from the oiled streets. A look at Clarence or Barrie streets, shows how the dust is worked up. It is held, by those who claim to know, that the city is not generous enough in its oil supply and that watering carts are not the best kind of carts for the work. In Toronto, carts with longer pipes and larger outlets are used, and the oil is used so liberally that it simply hardens the dust the whole mixture forming a mat over the road that is impervious to water. To make the oiling a success in Kingston, it is held that similar work will have to be done here.

A Young Man Killed.

Word was received by Sidney Pearson, Wellington, of the death of his nephew, Norman Trumppour, aged twenty-one through an accident on July 6th while riding a motorcycle. He struck a moving engine and was killed instantly. His father also met with an accident a short time ago, breaking his leg in two places and is just now getting around. Norman was a remarkably talented young man and his untimely death has cast a gloom over the entire neighborhood. He is a nephew of George A. Trumppour, Pictou, and the only son of William Trumppour.

CAUGHT IN THE WEST.

A Man Must Answer for Crime in East.

Provincial Detective Joseph Greer has left for Edmonton to bring back Peter Sherman Wagar, wanted on a charge of rape and assault on May 23rd, at Camden East near Napanee.
