HEARD A PROPOSITION

REGARDING SITE FOR TUBERCULOSIS HOSPITAL.

No Definite Action Taken—Will be Further Discussed at Meeting Board Governors Monday—Early Settlement Looked For.

It is believed that the question of a site for the Mowat Memorial tuberculosis hospital, will be finally decided upon, at a meeting of the governors of the general hospital, to be held on Monday afternoon.

On Friday afternoon, there was a meeting of the memorial committee, and there was a good attendance. Great interest is being taken in the matter. At this meeting, a proposition was discussed, as regards the site, but no definite decision was made, although the members are doing good work, and it is believed that a happy solution of the whole matter will be found.

At the meeting of the board of governors, Monday, the proposition will further be discussed. It is understood that the board has two or three sites, which would be suitable.

LOST FIFTY YEARS.

Watch Given General Burnett in Civil War Just Reaches Him.

General Henry L. Burnett, of Goshen, N.Y., received by registered mail from Chicago a key winder silver watch that had been dispatched to him by messenger during the civil war and never reached him.

General Burnett was major of the Second Ohio regiment, when A. N. Hoffman sent him the watch with the inscription on the case, "Presented to Major Henry L. Burnett by Hon. A. N. Hoffman."

FUNNY TRIAL AT BERLIN.

Millionaire's Daughter Tells Why She Whistled Off German Sailor.

Berlin, July 15.—Berlin is interested and amused over the trial of the young Count Metternich, a nephew of Count Wolf Metternich, the German ambassador, at London, on the charge of cheating his creditors and living extravagantly on an allowance of seven dollars a month, from his angry father. The count's defense is that he had never prospect of marrying Gertrude Wertherin, the daughter of the millionaire owner of one of Berlin's stores. The mother of the girl denied that there was any idea of the count's marriage to her daughter, who is in love with a German officer, and who broke off her acquaintance with the young aristocrat on learning that he had borrowed money from an hotel waiter in order to pay for cakes which the family wanted at a tea party.

The count has been in jail for nine months, awaiting trial for card swindles at various continental capitals under the leadership of Baron Korff Koenig, alias Rudolph Stallman, who is well-known in the United States.

ORDERS FOR ENGINES.

Mackenzie and Mann Place Contracts For Twenty.

Toronto, July 15.—While people in the east are hearing daily of the scarcity of money owing to the amount needed to move the crops in the west, those far-sighted men of finance, Sir William Mackenzie and Sir Donald Mann, apparently are not worried. They have just placed with the Canada Foundry company an order for twenty locomotive engines for delivery this year, and J. J. Ashworth, assistant general manager of the company, stated that the first delivery will be made in August.

The locomotives are what is known as "consolidation engines with super heaters," and are each to weigh 112 tons. The factory stock is being increased daily, and Mr. Ashworth stated that they are now in a better position than ever to handle this class of business. He added that he was given to understand that the new locomotives would be used for the hauling of western business, and more particularly in the grain trade. A locomotive costs about \$15,000, so this order will run about \$300,000.

STRONG MAN DEAD.

Used to Burst Chains and Lift Enormous Weights.

New York, July 15.—Charles Jefferson, who was Barium and Bailey's strong man twenty-five years ago, and who used to pose for St. Gaudens and other sculptors, dropped dead of apoplexy. He lived in the old-time actors' boarding house neighborhood. Jefferson was about six feet two inches tall, and in his best days had remarkable strength. He lifted enormous weights, and was one of the attractions of the circus in the days when side-show performers had their greatest vogue. His first circus job was as an acrobat, but he drifted naturally into posing for feats of strength.

ARRESTED AFTER BOASTING.

Philadelphia Prisoner Says He Falsified McNamara Dynamite.

Philadelphia, July 15.—As a result of boasts that he supplied the dynamite to blow up the Los Angeles, California, Times, Charles Beck, thirty years of age, said to be a New York structural iron worker, is in a cell here, pending word from the authorities of Los Angeles. Beck for several days has been loitering about the criminal courts in City Hall. During that time he struck up an acquaintance with a citizen and confided to this man that he had dealings with James McNamara, who is charged with nineteen murders in connection with the destruction of the newspaper office.

Despatches from Persia say the cabinet has resigned and the country is in a state of anarchy. Rebellious movements have started in several provinces. Forty villages are sacked by rebels.

A FIRE AT INVERARY

BAD BLAZE OCCURRED ON SATURDAY MORNING.

Bakeshop of John Gerald, With Post Office and General Store, Was Guttered—Fire Started From Some Unknown Cause.

Inverary was visited by a bad blaze on Saturday morning. Fire from some unknown cause, started in the bakeshop of John Gerald, and the bakeshop with the postoffice and general store, were gutted. The fire started about ten o'clock.

The Whig telephoned Inverary about eleven o'clock, and at that time, the fire was still raging, and the villagers turned out, in an endeavor to save adjoining buildings.

An hotel and harness shop is situated next to the buildings which caught fire, and the villagers did their best to save them from the flames. The cause of the fire is unknown, and the loss could not be ascertained, although it was stated that it would be very heavy.

In fighting the flames, John Gerald had his face and hands badly burned. The Bell Telephone office is situated in the general store, and while the operator was talking to the Whig, the fire was burning in one part of the building.

MOTOR CAR MERGER.

A \$500,000,000 Company is the Report in New York.

New York, July 15.—Automobile and financial interests are quietly but earnestly interested in a rumor to the effect that a gigantic merger of motor car manufacturers is being effected, with the result that the three largest factories of automobile builders and the largest tire combination may shortly be controlled by a holding company.

The concerns said to be interested are the General Motors company, the United States Motor company, the Studebaker interests, including the E. M. F. and Planters plants at Detroit, and the United States Tire company.

The combined capital of these interests will approach \$500,000,000, for not only are the automobile and rubber plants to be considered, but each sub-merger already controls hundreds of accessory and sundry manufacturing embracing every part and attribute of an automobile.

No Pardon for Winnipeg Negro.

East Grand Forks, Minn., July 15.—William Goff, the Winnipeg negro convicted in this city last year of manslaughter, and sent to the Minnesota penitentiary for fifteen years, failed to secure a pardon at the hands of the state board of pardons. Goff made application for a pardon, but was denied. He was convicted of killing a woman and both he and the murdered woman had been residents of Winnipeg shortly before coming to East Grand Forks.

St. Paul Firm Gets Contract.

St. Paul, Minn., July 15.—The Canadian Northern railway to-day awarded a contract to a St. Paul firm for the construction of 550 miles of railway to cost \$15,000,000. The line will extend from Port Arthur, Ontario, on the north shore of Lake Superior to Sellwood Junction, just north of Sudbury.

Three Years for Bigamist.

Quebec, July 15.—On a charge of bigamy, to which he pleaded guilty, Eugene Turcotte was sentenced to three years in the penitentiary. Turcotte has a wife at St. Malachie, Quebec, and was married at St. Malachie, Quebec county, on Jan. 31st, last year.
