T. N. CAMPSALL IS SAFE

BUT HIS TWO BROTHERS CANNOT BE FOUND.

The First Named Went From Kingston to Porcupine Eleven Years Ago—His Brothers Were Formerly of Godfrey.

T. N. Campsall safe, but two of his brothers, Wesley and Ernest, also Wesley's wife and two children, missing, as the result of the Porcupine fire, was the word received by relatives in Kingston. T. N. Campsall, formerly of Kingston, settled in New Liskeard seven years ago, and was one of the first men on the ground at Porcupine. He was conducting a mining broker's office, at Cobalt, which he removed to Porcupine, having extensive interests in the new fields. His youngest brother, Ernest, was in charge of the office principally, as Mr. Campsall has done a lot of prospecting over these northern regions.

The last letter received before the fire stated that he had started out to prospect eight veteran claims near Porcupine. In consequence, considerable anxiety was felt by friends. A letter just received states that Mr. Campsall left Porcupine for his home at New Liskeard, to harvest a valuable hay crop, just a few hours before the fire broke out, or he might have been caught in the woods where very few escaped. Though Mr. Campsall has sent in all directions he has failed to locate his brothers as yet. Wesley Campsall's home was burned and himself, his wife and two children, boy and girl, are missing. If report is correct, Mr. Campsall's office is unharmed, but there is no trace of Ernest Campsall as yet. Mr. Campsall is conducting the search in person. It is feared the missing ones may have gone out on the lake and been drowned. The missing men are the oldest and the youngest sons of John Campsall, formerly of Godfrey, now of Cobalt. Ernest Campsall's wife and baby also reside at Cobalt.

Ireland is Doing Pretty Well

Ireland isn't so badly off as some reports that reach this country would indicate. A correspondent of the Chicago News writes that "figures have been compiled showing that the country possesses more than 2,000,000 hens and 250,000 goats. It is exporting nearly \$20,000,000 worth of poultry produce, while England imports \$35,000,000 worth of eggs." He adds that "Ireland, according to these figures, is becoming a second Denmark. The increase in poultry is due principally to the establishment of co-operative depots, which have steadily multiplied. The recently-started society called the United Irish Women is rapidly becoming a force in the development of agriculture, and it is believed that the efforts of the organization will result in a greatly reduced emigration."

Remains Were Interred

The remains of the late Mrs. Mary Pallister, who was found dead in bed, were taken to St. Mary's cemetery, Monday afternoon, about five o'clock, and buried. The decomposed state of the body made it necessary to bury it as soon as possible. She was an attendant of St. Mary's cathedral and it is likely that this church will provide for her burial. It is understood that she has a son somewhere in England. Her lodging was fumigated on Tuesday.

A search of the premises was made, this morning, by Coroner Ross and Police constable Timmerman, to ascertain the belongings of deceased. No money was found, but a number of papers were taken in charge by Coroner Ross and will be forwarded to relatives in Chelsea, England.

Fairlie, Monday, afternoon, when Miss Alberta Agnes Cunningham, eldest daughter of Charles Cunningham, 56 Bay street, of this city, was united in marriage to George E. W. They will visit Toronto and Guelph and will reside in Buffalo, where Mr. Rudd is making his headquarters. The young couple were well liked here and had many friends to bid them their farewell.

Oil Lamps Poison Calculata

A great nuisance arises at night in Calculata from the open flames of oil lamps. It is estimated that 20,000 to 30,000 of these are used in various shops and small factories in the town and suburbs. The health committee of Calculata is considering an amendment to the Bengal smoke nuisance act to prohibit the use of such lamps, as their smoke is a source of throat and lung complaints.

LIVE STOCK MARKETS. The Prices Paid at the Various Centres.

Montreal, July 17.—About 920 head of butcher's cattle, 2,700 calves, 40 inlet cows and springers, 600 sheep and lambs, and 1,200 hogs, were offered for sale at the East End Abattoir to-day. The effects of the recent spell of hot weather have not totally vanished yet. A few of the best heaves sold at about 6c. per pound, while the other stock sold at from 3 1/2c. to 5 1/2c. per lb. The prices asked for milch cows ranged from \$50 to \$75 each, but few were sold.

Calves sold at from 2 1/2c. to 6c. per pound.

Sheep sold at from 2 1/2c. to 4c. per lb. Lambs at \$4 to \$5 each.

Hogs sold at from 5c. to 10c. per pound, while for large sows, 4 1/2c. per pound was the price offered.

Chicago Cattle Market. Chicago, July 17.—Cattle receipts estimated at 25,000; market generally steady; heaves, \$4.85 to \$7; Texas steers, \$4.60 to \$6.10; western steers, \$4.75 to \$5.90; stockers and feeders, \$3 to \$5.10; cows and heifers, \$2.25 to \$5.75; calves, \$5 to \$7.25.

Hogs receipts estimated at 34,000; market steady to shade up; light, \$6.40 to \$6.85; mixed, \$6.35 to \$6.55; heavy, \$6.15 to \$6.83; rough, \$6.15 to \$6.40; good to choice, heavy, \$6.40 to \$6.82; pigs, \$5.50 to \$6.45; bulk of sales, \$6.55 to \$6.75.

Sheep receipts estimated at 22,000; market steady; native, \$2.60 to \$4.65; western, \$3 to \$4.78; yearlings, \$4.40 to \$5.50; lambs, native, \$4 to \$7.10; western, \$4.50 to \$7.

Toronto Cattle Market. Toronto, July 17.—The expert trade is very quiet, with last week's prices prevailing. Butcher cattle are brisk to-day, and are of a very good quality. The trade in lambs is very slow, with a drop from ten to eleven to eight to nine cents. Hogs continue to advance, being now \$7.10 f.o.b., and \$7.40 fed and watered. Receipts are 56 cars, comprising 1,790 cattle, 34 calves, 299 hogs, 853 sheep.
