**HE WILL INVESTIGATE THE SINDHAD AFFAIR.**  
**THE GENERAL SECRETARY AGREES WITH WHIG.**

Grounding of Steamer at Chicoutimi Harbor Entrance Causes Complaint, and Will be Enquired Into.  
 Captain J. J. Riley, district superintendent of pilots, Montreal, is coming to Kingston, to hold an enquiry into the grounding of the Sindhad of the Hall Forwards company service at the entrance to Chicoutimi harbor, June 16th last.  
 The Sindhad, carrying a full load of structural steel from Buffalo, was unfortunately grounded so close to the harbor wharf that it was possible for her entire cargo to be discharged without difficulty, but this circumstance does not detract from the fact that the vessel had been poorly navigated.  
 Local officials of lake and river transportation companies are much wrought up by the numerous accidents. There have been half a dozen accidents of different kinds since navigation opened this season and local shipping merchants claim that every one has been due to faulty pilotage.

**Caspian in Dock.**  
 The steamer Caspian is now in the Davis dry dock, after a great deal of trouble. Both her wheels had to be taken off before she could get through the bridge, and two motor boats towed her from there to the dock. She jammed the dock when going in, and had to be pulled out again, but is now safe in the dock.  
 It is estimated that the damage done will not exceed \$600. The starboard bilge suffered the most, and the work will be confined principally to this point. The Caspian was not leaking, badly, and was easily kept afloat Sunday and Monday with her own siphon. The employees of the steamboat company are doing the work on her, and expect to have her in commission again on Friday.

**Marine Paragraphs.**  
 At Swift's wharf: The steamer Rideau Queen was up from Ottawa, yesterday, and cleared for there again this morning; steamers North King and Toronto, made the river trip today; yacht Niagara went down the Rideau canal, this morning, with a fishing party; steamer Keywest stopped, last night, on her way up; steamer Aethia was down from Bay port yesterday; steamer Lamonde was up from Clayton yesterday.  
 At Folger's wharf: The steamer Alexandria was down, last night, with a heavy passenger list, on her way to Quebec. The passenger traffic is so heavy on this boat that little or no freight is carried.  
 Another start was made by the Calvin company to release the barge barge of the Montreal Transportation company's fleet. One of the Montreal Transportation company's tugs and the two tugs which the Calvin company brought from Ottawa for that purpose, went down and commenced to work at her again today. The lifting of her requires the services of two powerful tugs and she has to be lifted slowly.

**M.T. Co's elevator:** The tug Glide arrived up from Montreal, with two light barges; the steamer Glenmount arrived from Welland canal, with the oil barge No. 86 in tow, lightered and proceeded to Montreal; the tug Mary left, to-day, with the oil barge No. 86, for Montreal; the steamer Westmont is due to pass up, to-night, loaded with steel rails for Fort William; the tug Emerson was up, from Montreal, last night, with three light barges, and cleared for Port Colborne.  
 As Richardson's elevator: The steamer John Randall cleared for Oswego, yesterday; the schooner Abbie L. Andrews cleared for Oswego, today; the schooner Kewatin cleared, to-day, with feldspar, for Charlotte.

**NO INQUEST TO BE HELD**  
 Regarding the Death of Mrs. Mary Pallister.  
 There will be no inquest into the death of Mrs. Mary Pallister, the woman who was found dead in bed at her rooms over Lawler's liquor store on Wellington street, Monday afternoon. Every indication points to the fact that death resulted from a hemorrhage of the lungs as the bed and bedding was soaked with blood, which had partly dried.

**NO PHYSICAL DIRECTOR YET.**  
 No appointment for physical director of the Kingston Y.M.C.A. has been made yet, and the authorities at the "Y.M." have no one in view. It is not necessary to have one for some time yet, as gymnastics at this time of the year are not much in demand when access to the open air is available. It was just about this time that the post was vacated last year, by the departure of James J. Thompson for Peterboro.

**Good Work Going On.**  
 The work of collecting paper in the city by the boys of the Y.M.C.A. in aid of a boys' department, which it is proposed to build, is progressing favorably. The gymnasium is used as the receptacle into which the loose paper and paste-board is dumped, and when the boys get together they bale it up and ship it away. It is a method by which a great deal of money will be obtained.

**BELLROCK YOUNG MEN**

**WERE FINED FOR SWIMMING NAKED IN RIVER.**

**Case Was Heard at Verona—The Accused Pleaded Justification—Place Used for Swimming for Many Years.**  
 Eight Bellrock young men and boys were each fined two dollars by Justices of the Peace G. H. Hunter and David Rae, who held court at Verona, on Monday, for going swimming naked in the Napanee river, close to the village of Bellrock, on June 11th last. Eleven were summoned, but the charge against three was thrown out. The charge was laid by William Pomeroy, E. M. Yorke and the complainant appeared for the prosecution, and B. S. O'Loughlin, Yarker, for the defence. The case was heard in the Verona village hall, which was crowded with spectators, who evinced great interest in the proceedings. The case lasted six hours.  
 The prosecution showed that the young men had exposed themselves near a house and within sight of young women. The defence claimed that the pond had been used for swimming for many years, and there had been no complaint before. The justices found, however, that it was unlawful for people to expose their persons in public places, and that the young men must be punished. A fine of four dollars each was first imposed, but before the papers were signed, Justice Hunter suggested to the accused that if they would sign a recognition for fifty dollars, promising not to swim naked at the place again for a year, the fine would be cut in two. This was agreed to, and two dollars was imposed.

**DECORATE FOR THE OLD BOYS.**

**The Merchants Have a Great Chance to Make Displays.**

Some of the merchants are going to decorate their stores in old-fashioned style in honor of the old boys home-coming.
