REPAIRS TO A DREDGE
ARE BEING MADE AT GANAN-
OQUE THIS WEEK.
Another Mishap to a Gananoque
Launch—A Leeds Township
Farmer Paid \$100 for Adulterat-
ing Milk.
Gananoque, July 18.—The govern-
ment dredge Ottawa, which has been
doing service in deepening the Cana-
dian waterway in this section, was
brought over Sunday afternoon by
the government tug Beaver, the for-
mer having had a mishap requiring
repairs. She was brought up into Gan-
anoque river, yesterday afternoon,
and repairs have been started. It is
expected that the Ottawa will prob-
ably do service in the near vicinity
later on in the season. As an approp-
riation was made by the government
in their estimates covering consider-
able work for the town and its ap-
proaches.
George A. Robinson has again proved

necessitating a large amount of re-

THE LATE M. P. BRESEK.
He Was for Years Well Known in
Brookville.
Malcolm P. Breske, a well-known
citizen of Brookville, and life-long re-
sident of the township of Bastard,
passed away Sunday night, at his re-
sidence, corner John and George
streets. He had been ill for several
weeks.
The late Malcolm Peter Breske was
born in the township of Bastard on
Dec. 9th, 1839. He was the eldest
son of the late Peter Breske and his
wife, Bernelia Nichols. His grand-
father, the late Nicholas Breske, was
one of the noble band of United Em-
pire Loyalists who came to Canada
when it was a wilderness and settled
in Bastard township, Brookville at
that time containing but four dwell-
ings.
The subject of this sketch was mar-
ried in 1866 to Bethesda, eldest
daughter of the late Thomas Stev-
ens, of Bastard, and she with two
children, Miss Rose, at home, and
Herbert T. Breske, of this town, sur-
vive. Another son, Albert M., died
six years ago. One brother, Felix
Breske, Delta, and two sisters, Mrs.
D. C. McIntyre, Brookville, and Mrs.
T. E. Birch, Detroit, Mich., are also
called upon to mourn his demise.
Deceased resided in the township of
Bastard, following farming, until 1900,
when he purchased the farm on the
front road west, north of Fernbank,
where he remained until 1906, when
he retired and moved into the town.

The late Mr. Breske was known
throughout the township as one
of the best kept and most up-to-date
in appointments throughout the
township. He was also one of the
pioneers of dairying and owned the
first creamery in that township.
In religion deceased was a Baptist
and since coming to Brookville had
been an active worker in the First
Baptist church, being a member of
the trustee board. Politically he was
a staunch supporter of the liberal
party and its principles.

ACCUSED MAN CHARGES
ACCUSERS WITH BLACKMAIL.
Detective Said to Have Sent Black
Hand Letters to Eric Millionaire
Sneakers Out Warrants.

Pittsburg, July 18.—Gilbert B. Per-
kins, head of a private detective agency
of this city, who some time ago charged
with using the mails to defraud Charles H.
Strong, multi-millionaire railroad man
of Erie, Pa., has sworn out warrants
against Charles B. and George R.
Martz, brothers, alleging blackmail.

They are alleged to have repre-
sented to the United States authori-
ties that they had valuable informa-
tion against Perkins, resulting from
the desecration of the mausoleum in
the Erie, Pa., cemetery of the late
Congressman Scott, father of Mrs.
Strong, and the subsequent "black
hand" letters received by Mr. Strong.
Perkins will be tried at Erie next
Monday on a charge of conspiracy.

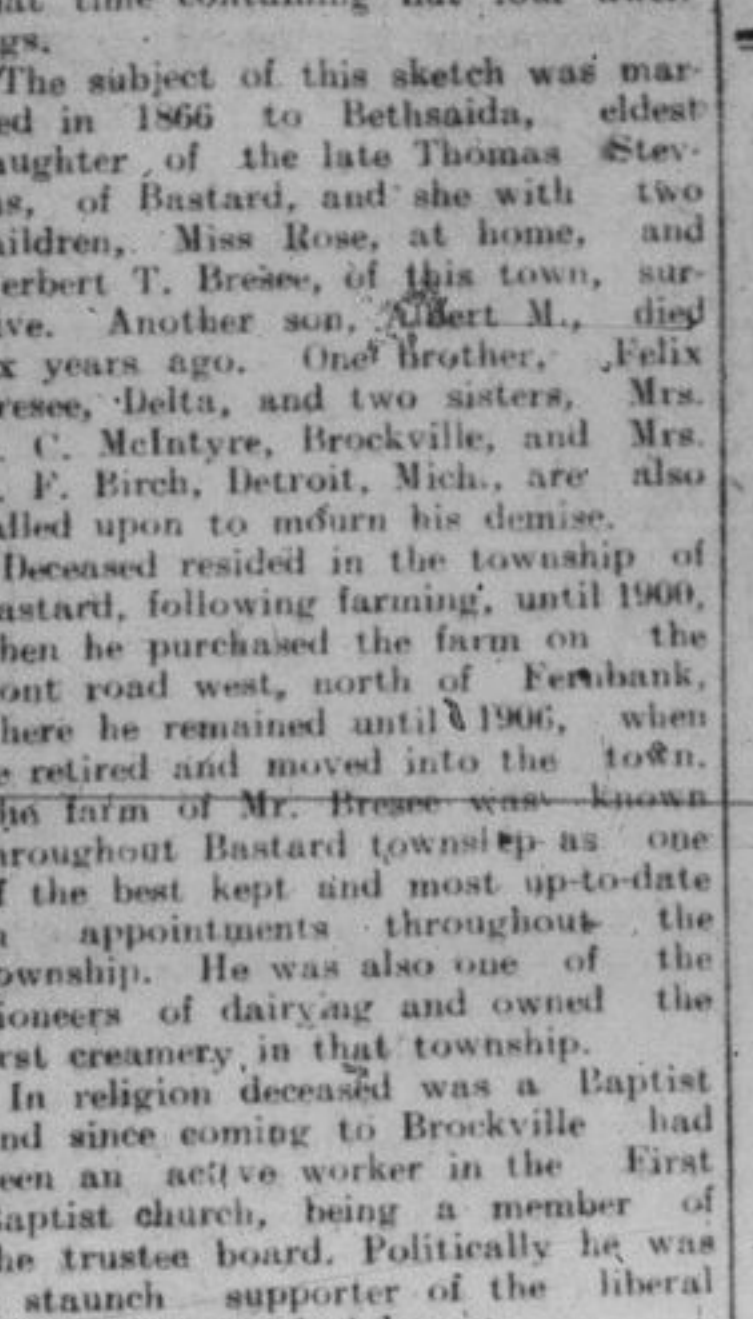
Orangemen at Sydenham.

rents', Mr. and Mrs. D. F. Armstrong.

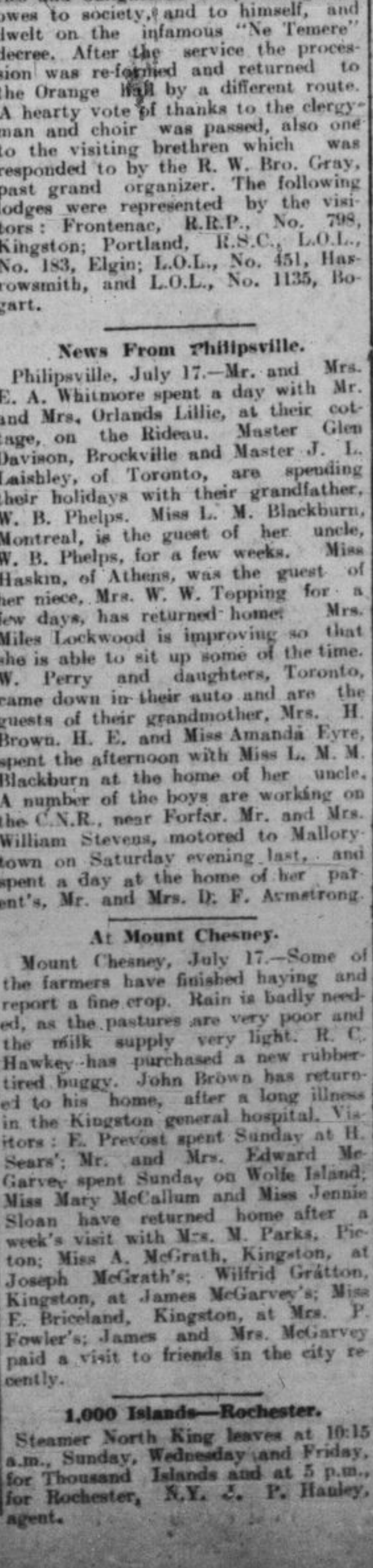
At Mount Chesney.
