HULL MINES BURNED

FIRE SWEEP AN AREA LARGER THAN THOUGHT.

Three More Bodies Found, and One Was Identified—The Relief Fund Totals \$43,522.

Toronto, July 18.—A private wire reports the Hull mines, four miles north-west of Porcupine, burnt out John Storer, manager, left there on Sunday, after the big disaster, and his mine was all right then. This shows the fire swept an area larger than thought.

The Porcupine relief fund now totals \$43,522.

He is Alive.

Toronto, July 18.—J. S. Taylor, White Horse, Yukon, reported dead, at the Porcupine fire, is still living. He is in hospital at New Liskeard.

A Skeleton Found.

Porcupine, July 18.—The skeleton of "Cripple Creek" Bennett, a well-known character around here, was found on the site of the Empire theatre, South Porcupine. It was identified by a watch. The only thing left of the theatre was the piano key board. Two more bodies were found this morning near Frederick House river and railway.

Suicided in Cells.

Peterboro, July 18.—George Hope committed suicide in the police station cells, this morning. He was arrested, yesterday, for drunkenness. Last night he seemed normal; through the night he slashed his jugular vein with a pocket knife. He had been drinking heavily for some time.

Seizing All Whiskey.

Porcupine, July 18.—Great precautions are being taken to prevent the shipment of liquor to the camp, and every suspicious looking bundle is being seized by the T. and N.O.R. at the station. They have in this way intercepted a large quantity of whiskey and other strong drinks.

Buried Family in Mud.

Golden City, Ont., July 18.—Among those who were reported among the missing and have since turned up are Léola Naltee, a Frenchman, his wife and seven children, ranging in age from five months to sixteen years. They came into Golden City on Saturday and are housed in King's amusement parlor with a number of others. When the fire started Vallee ran for the right-of-way of the T. & N. O. ASK FOR DIVORCE LAW.

MEMORIAL IS PLANNED FOR CARRIE-NATION.

Money Collected by W.C.T.U. to Aid Prohibition Considered Fitting Tribute.

Kansas City, Kas., July 18.—After weeks of discussion in which some favoring of oil painting of Mrs. Nation, while others thought that her statue should be placed under the dome of the Kansas capitol, the Woman's Christian Temperance Association decided that a memorial fund to carry on the fight Mrs. Nation had waged during her lifetime would be the most appropriate memorial.

The plan is to raise a fund in each state and county to be in charge of the national board of the W.C.T.U., the fund to be known as the Carrie Nation memorial fund.

The fund is mostly to be used in states where prohibitory laws have been enacted and the liquor interests are trying to keep the law from being enforced.

EMPEROR EMPHASIZES THE NECESSITY OF RE-ORGANIZING THE AUSTRIAN ARMY.

Vienna, Austria, July 18.—Emperor Francis Joseph opened the re-organizing, to-day, showing no trace of his recent illness. In the speech from the throne he emphasized the necessity of re-organization of the army to keep pace with the development of other countries.

Kingston Sunday Cars.

Toronto World. Rev. Mr. Rochester, of the Lord's Day Alliance, is not opposed to Sunday cars in Toronto because they are legal in this city, and the fourth commandment has been abrogated here to that extent. But in Kingston he holds that Sunday cars are illegal, and the decalog holds good throughout.

The Kingston Street Car company contends that it has a franchise right to run the cars on Sunday, the agreement dating from 1876, and having been confirmed by act of parliament in 1892. Much is gained, however, in the concession that the question of Sunday cars is no longer one of right and wrong, but merely of legality or illegality. The people will attend to the legality.

The Crisis is Coming.

Montreal Herald. On this day week, there will be a condition the like of which has not existed since 1866, when the Elgin-Maryo reciprocity treaty came to its end. The markets of the United States will be opened to the principal natural products of Canada if Canada wants it so. From Cape Breton to Vancouver Island there is scarcely a community which is not directly interested in taking advantage of the opportunity. All that stands in the way is Mr. Borden's declaration that it must not be. If he persists in that attitude, if he will not even allow the majority in parliament to vote on the subject then there must be an election and at once. Sir Wilfrid, it is plain, is ready for the test of opinion.

It required about fourteen or sixteen stitches to close the wound. He is reported to be doing nicely.

Appointed to General Hospital.

Miss Kate Baird, of Blackwater, Ont., a graduate of the Lillian Massey school of domestic science, Toronto and for three years dietitian in the Victoria hospital, London, Ont., began her duties on Tuesday as dietitian of the Kingston general hospital, training school for nurses.

Injured His Hand.

Frederick Clarke, mechanic at the Kingston and Pembroke roundhouse, jammed his hand while at work Tuesday morning, injuring three fingers. Dr. McCarthy was called and dressed the hand.

Died in Toronto Jail.

Toronto, July 18.—William Phillips, held in jail for examination as to his sanity, died, this morning. It is believed he was affected by heat.

ASK FOR DIVORCE LAW.

At the Present Time Absolute Divorce is Prohibited in Mexico.

Mexico City, July 18.—Reno's divorce mills will be regarded as second-rate and their output insignificant when compared with the system a group of women would establish in Mexico for the purpose of untieing marital knots. Since the last week in June women's clubs, editorial writers, the clergy and others of an argumentative turn, have been discussing the daring and radical petition of 500 women, members of the club Amigas del Pueblo, in which President de la Barra was asked to initiate a reform in the laws granting the right of divorce. This is the same club whose members have been unusually active in their efforts to secure for women the right of suffrage.

Under the laws of Mexico absolute divorce is prohibited. The law provides for a legal separation, but in no case may either remarry. In their petition the women characterize the law as unjust, and go so far as to suggest that absolute divorce should be granted upon the mere request of either husband or wife.

That Mexico will provide a divorce law for her unhappily wed is improbable.
