WALKED INTO KNIVES

by Tramps.

Newboro, July 18.—Master Giles
Wright, the little son of Mr. and Mrs.
Saunders Wright, was the victim of a
peculiar accident, last week. His
grandfather, Thomas Wright, was
mowing hay and sent the little fellow
on a message. On his return he
walked through the hay to the ma-
chine and was not seen by Mr. Mc-
Cann until too late. He walked into
the knives of the machine and a nasty
wound was inflicted on his ankle. The
little sufferer was brought to Dr.
King's office, where the wound was
dressed, and stitches being necessary.
Fortunately the bone was not injured
and the little fellow will be able to
walk in a few days.
