## WALKED INTO KNIVES

OF HAY MOWING MACHINE AND WAS BADLY CUT.

Accident to Newboro Boy—Epidemic of Black Leg Among Cattle Near Portland—Doctor Held Up by Tramps.

Newboro, July 18.—Master Giles Wright, the little son of Mr. and Mrs. Saunders Wright, was the victim of a peculiar accident, last week. His grandfather, Mr. McNamee, was mowing hay and sent the little fellow on a message. On his return he walked through the hay to the machine and was not seen by Mr. McNamee until too late. He walked into the knives of the machine and a nasty wound was inflicted on his ankle. The little sufferer was brought to Dr. King's office, where the wound was dressed, six stitches being necessary. Fortunately the bone was not injured and the little fellow will be able to walk in a few days.

J. C. Yaeger, last week, purchased from the Gilbert boat works, Brockville, a fine thirty-two-foot launch, which is the fastest on local waters, being capable of making over twenty-five miles an hour.
