In the gallery there was a clatter and a crash as one of the boys mentioned started for the door.



FELL DOWN AND DIED

THOMAS EVANS, OF UNION STREET, STRICKEN ON STREET.

His Body Found Lying on Grass Plot Opposite Finkle's Livery Stricken With Heart Failure.

About 7:30 o'clock, Thursday morning, two boys were passing down Clarence street, opposite Finkle's livery, when they noticed a man lying in the grass at the side of the walk opposite. They at once notified Mr. Finkle and Dr. W. Nicholls, and they telephoned for the police, who notified Coroner Kilborn, and sent a call for Corbett's ambulance. Police Constables Naylor and Timmerman made investigation and found the body to be that of Thomas Evans, 68 Union street.

Mr. Evans was lying with his face upwards, and had only been dead a few minutes as he had left his house, only a short time. A few minutes before, a man had passed over the walk, and no person was there. The deceased was on his way to sweep out the Exploration Company's office, of which he was caretaker.

The remains were removed to Corbett's undertaking parlors. Dr. Kilborn decided that no inquest was necessary, as death merely resulted from heart failure.

Mr. Evans was about fifty-five years of age and had lived in Kingston some time. He was also caretaker of Wellington street school, Knights of Columbus building, and D. S. Robertson's grounds. He was a Welshman by birth. In religion he was a Methodist, and attended Sydenham street church. He is survived by a wife, but no other relations in this city. The funeral will take place Saturday.
