VERY SUDDEN DEATH

OF PAUL PETERSON, OF NAP-
ANE, ON THURSDAY.Dropped Dead at Stoney Point.
Peter G. Wager will be examined
as to His Sanity—Welcome to a
New Minister.

Napanee, July 21.—Another terribly sudden death took place yesterday afternoon, when Paul Peterson, one of Napanee's best known citizens, dropped dead, of heart trouble. Mr. Peterson had not been in the best of health since spring, and the doctor advised him to attempt no strenuous work, although he was able to be on his job on the sewer, supervising the blasting, at which he was an expert. Yesterday he took his family down the river, and it was at Stoney Point that death overtook him. He leaves a widow and two daughters. The remains were brought to his home on Pictie Hill, and the funeral will likely take place on Saturday.
