OFFICERS RE-ELECTED AN "ARSON TRUST" THE SPORT REVIEW

Dr. R. J. Reade, Toronto, is President—Two Papers Were Read at the Friday Evening Session.

Greatly refreshed from their delightful trip down the river on the steamer North King, Friday, the Eastern Ontario dentists, who met here for the annual convention, returned to the city at four o'clock Friday afternoon, and resumed business. They were much impressed with the beauties of the St. Lawrence river and the Thousand Islands.

The election of officers, which was put off until all the dentists who were attending the convention could be present, took place. All last year's officers were re-elected, namely: President, Dr. R. J. Reade, Toronto; vice-president, Dr. A. J. Morrow, Maxville; secretary-treasurer, Dr. W. C. Macartney, Ottawa; supervisor of clinics, Dr. A. W. Winnett, Kingston; membership and ethics committee, Dr. A. A. Smith (Cornwall), and Dr. E. M. Ely (Ottawa); programme committee, Dr. R. J. Reade (Toronto), Dr. R. E. Sparks (Kingston), and Dr. W. C. Macartney (Ottawa).

In the evening one of the most interesting papers of the whole convention was read by Dr. W. E. Cummer, one of the best known dentists of Toronto, on "The Articulation of Artificial Teeth," and the discussion later was led by Dr. E. M. Ely, of Ottawa. The second paper, on "Sensitive Denture," by Dr. W. Allan Armstrong, of Ottawa, was also very instructive, and the cause of much discussion, led by Dr. S. A. Ayrault, of Kingston. This concluded the business of the convention, and the visiting dentists and their wives left for their home with pleasant remembrances of their short stay in Kingston.

Police Court Cases.

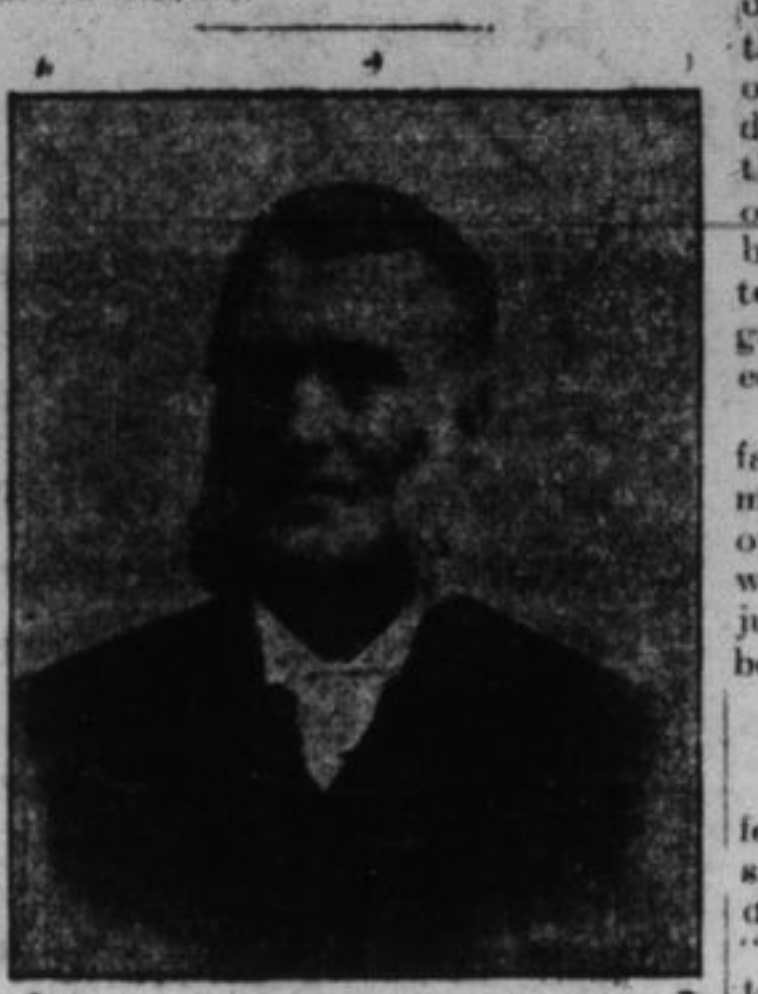

CLAIMED TO BE AT WORK IN UNITED STATES CITIES.

Buffalo, Among Victims of Depredations of Widespread Gang of Firebugs, Declares Illinois Fire Marshal.

Chicago, July 22.—That there exists a gigantic, country-wide arson trust, with headquarters in Kansas City and representatives in nearly all the large cities, the members of which make a business of setting fire to buildings to enable the owners to collect large sums of insurance, was charged, yesterday, by C. J. Boyle, state fire marshal, in an address before the Chicago Association of Commerce.

MANY TRAGIC ENDS

TO PEOPLE SEEKING PLEASURE AND COMFORT.

Lightning and Trolley Cars Do Dastardly Work—Prominent Young Ladies Were Drowned.

Toronto, July 22.—This morning's despatches tell of a score of tragic deaths from various causes among people seeking the pleasures of summer evenings in various parts of the northern states. At Greensburg, Pa., lightning struck a boarding house killing three and injuring several, mostly Italians. At Raton, N.J., trolley cars, running at high speed, crashed together killing three and injuring twenty-four, some seriously. At Dowigiac, Mich., three young women, of prominent families, were drowned while bathing. Other accidents, bringing the total of deaths to twenty and the injured to one hundred, occurred in various parts of Ohio, New York and other states, all last evening.
