BROCK DEFEATED COOKE'S IN THE LAST INNINGS.

Won Out by 6 to 5—Cooke's Practically Put Out of the Championship Running—The Game Was Very Exciting.

After being at the small end of the score all through the game, and not giving any prospect of winning until the last innings, Brock street team defeated Cooke's last evening at Victoria school grounds, by six runs to five.
