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WOULD DISFRANCHISE THE NEGROES OF THE STATE OF GEORGIA FOREVER.

Good Character Suffrage Is Proposed by Representative Slade, Who Would Leave Proof to the Women.

Atlanta, Ga., July 28.—Fixing good character as one requisite for qualifying to vote, and determining good character by the test of respect for good womanhood, is the intent of a proposed change in the constitution of Georgia, fathered by Representative J. J. Slade, of Muscogee county, and favorably reported to the legislature by the committee on constitutional amendments.

The friends of the amendment frankly admit its purpose is to forever disfranchise the negroes. Discussing the measure before the committee, Representative Slade declared that it will have the effect to disfranchise every negro in Georgia, regardless of what other qualifications he might possess.

"Circulars are being sent out to negroes all over the state telling them to hurry up and get in a position to qualify for the ballot under the educational and property qualifications," said he. "I want to stop it and make it impossible for anyone with a black or mulatto skin to vote in Georgia, no matter how much book learning he may possess. The protection of the white race demands that the negroes be made positively and forever the political inferiors of the whites, as they are the social inferiors."

In view of the fact that under the proposed amendment respect for good womanhood becomes the prime requisite for qualifying for the ballot, some members asked Capt. Slade how white men would be able to establish proof of good character as defined.

"Any good white man can get a good white woman to testify that she would trust him in the dark," replied the captain. "If any white man cannot, the second should be disfranchised."

The amendment provides that when the registrar refuses to register a man on the ground that he is not of good character, the latter may secure a reversal of the registrar's decision by securing the statement in person of two or more chaste white women of good standing before said registrar that they are willing to trust said applicant for registry. It is said the amendment will probably be passed.

IS MRS. HAYNE'S CHILD OF AUSTRIAN ALLIANCE?

Endeavoring to Prove That She is the Daughter of the Crown Prince Rudolph.

Montreal, July 28.—Mrs. George Osborne Hayne's claim to relationship with the royal house of Austria-Hungary is not credited in the official circles of the diplomatic service of the empire, represented in Montreal by Herman Hanna von Hassenheim, consul-general for Canada.

"It may not be chivalrous to doubt a lady's word," said Mr. von Hassenheim, "but I am of the opinion that Mrs. Hayne's story is of doubtful authenticity, to say the least. There have been many stories published of the private life of the Crown Prince Rudolph, most of which are altogether fanciful. This, I imagine, is one of them. The claim, of course, is not an impossible one, but it is a highly improbable one."

Further than this Mr. von Hassenheim did not care to discuss the matter, adding smilingly that he had no official interest in the case. Many stories have been published from time to time detailing the incidents leading up to the night of the death of Crown Prince Rudolph and the beautiful Countess Veera in the lonely hunting lodge in the forest of Meyerling. No official account of the tragedy in which the heir to the throne of Austria-Hungary met his end was issued from the ill-starred palace of the aged monarch Francis Joseph, the tragic history of whose immediate family has been a load of sorrow to the old emperor for many years—until he stands alone, a sad, heartbroken man of over eighty years of age.

The Crown Prince Rudolph had married, for reasons of state, Princess Stephanie of Belgium, but the alliance was not a happy one, there having been no love between the Austrian heir and the princess from the neighboring kingdom. This was the state of affairs between the two, when the prince met the beautiful Haromes Veera of Vienna and the two fell madly in love.

For many months the gossip of Vienna was busy associating the names of the two lovers with many unwise and secret meetings and at last the court and city were shocked by the news that Crown Prince Rudolph had petitioned the pope to divorce him from the Princess Stephanie and countenance his marriage with the Austrian baroness. This petition was refused by the pontiff, as were many others addressed to him. The royal father of the infatuated prince sternly refused his sanction to any such proceeding and things seemed hopeless for the lovers to whom report said a child had been born.

Strenuous efforts were being put forth to separate the two but to no avail. The prince threatened to renounce his claim to the throne of his father and to marry the baroness, in spite of the fates of emperors and popes. Marriage, however, without the blessing of the church seemed an empty proceeding to the beautiful baroness and the two spent secluded days together in the deepest misery.

Then, one night when things seemed hopeless, the two went together to the royal hunting lodge in the forest of Meyerling and died in each other's arms from poison self-administered. The child of the unhappy alliance disappeared and was believed to have been sent to America. That this child was Mrs. Hayne, nee Alma Veera is the belief of many, including the winsome little lady herself.

TO HAVE FINE RACE. Expect the Dixie IV. to Win Challenge Cup. Frontenac, N.Y., July 28.—Dixie IV., America's premier motor boat, which American motor boating enthusiasts hope will carry the stars and stripes to victory in the international gold challenge cup races, to be held over the Frontenac course August 2th, has arrived here.

The boat was shipped on her cradle from New York in a special car, and a special derrick lifted it from the car into the water. As soon as practicable it will be tried out over the new course.
