## CHILD WIFE SOLD COMMITTED SUICIDE THE CITY LOOKS WELL

### INTO BONDAGE—EDITH MCKAY AN OTTAWA GIRL.

Infamous Conduct Charged Against Husband Who was Shadowed by Police of Winnipeg—Revolting Case of White Slavery in Winnipeg. Winnipeg, Man., July 29.—Joseph L. McKinstry, of Ottawa, is held here on a charge of white slavery. For the prosecution it is alleged that he sold his child-wife to a house in the segregated area, where she was arrested. McKinstry is a nomad whose mother lives at Long Beach, Cal. But it was at Ottawa that he married Edith McKay, and after two months of married life, it is charged, brought her to Winnipeg and put her in a house of prostitution, receiving \$100 from the keeper. For three weeks she has been there and each night her husband, it is charged, has called to see what she had made and to collect it. The police knew of the deal and watched the band carefully, but it was only last night that he was arrested. Mrs. McKinstry is but eighteen years of age and is an Ottawa girl.

### BEFORE CONSTABLE SMITH IN ITS BRIGHT RECREATIONS FOR THE OLD BOYS.

A Clarendon Man Took Poison—He Was to Appear for Threatening to Shoot His Wife. A man named Hickey, belonging to Clarendon, who some time ago had trouble with his wife, and is alleged to have threatened to shoot her and some of the neighbors, committed suicide Friday afternoon, just about as he was to be arrested by Constable Smith, who went out from the city to bring him before Magistrate G. H. Hunter. Friends of Hickey were on the lookout for the officers of the law, and warned him when Constable Smith went out. He had poison in a bottle and drank it before the constable could reach him. A wire was sent to the city Saturday morning to his wife, who is living here at the present time, informing her of the fact of her husband's death. It is expected that Constable Smith will arrive in the city on the four o'clock train with the remains.

### THE CITY LOOKS WELL

Ald. John Carson is to be thanked for the erection of the Arch—The Coming of Sir Henry Pellatt. Kingston looks gay in its civic festival decorations. The business section is very prettily and effectively done in colors that will surely gladden the old boys as they arrive from the west and behold the outward symbols of welcome home. Ald. John Carson is worthy of much praise for the erection of a good old-fashioned arch of evergreens at the corner of King and Clarence streets. Only for his energies there would have been no arch at all. The arch is like those erected on Princess street in 1860 in honor of the late King Edward VII. The Stars and Stripes, floating on one of the central sections, is in honor of the old boys from Chicago. The electric welcome signs are very effective. King street, from the corner of Clarence over to Princess, is decked with flags. Clarence street never looked better since the present king drove on it. Some of the merchants have decorated lavishly. Two much admired stores are those of R. J. Reid and James Reid & Co. The former's is outlined in electric lamps, while the latter has an electric and gas sign. From Barrie to King streets, the main business thoroughfare is a mass of color. The large "Cook With Gas" electric sign makes an admirable background.

By Monday, the residences should all be decorated. A few flags hung out make a pretty effect. Alfred, Mack, Brook and Frontenac streets, in the vicinity of Victoria Park, should be especially well decorated. Portsmouth also promises to be in holiday attire as the old boys will be passing through the village on Sunday and Monday by hundreds. Sir Henry M. Pellatt made an endeavor years ago to accompany the Toronto old boys on their July excursion but was unable to get away. Now he has decided that he can no longer stay away from the limestone city. Sir Henry is one of the foremost Canadians to-day and why he did not receive a further royal honor is a mystery. As commander of the famous Queen's Own Rifles regiment, of Toronto, he has performed a great service to Canada and the empire. A most cordial greeting awaits him in Kingston. He and Lady Pellatt will be met at the steamer on Monday morning by representatives of the Kingston Old Boys' Association of Toronto and some of the civic receipt committee. During their stay they will be at the Frontenac.

### IN MARINE CIRCLES.

Arrivals and Departures of Vessels at This Port. The steamer Sowards arrived at Crawford's with coal from Oswego. The schooner Dundee cleared this morning for Fairhaven to load coal for Belleville. The steam barge John Randall passed through yesterday on its way from Oswego to Smith's Falls. At Swift's Steamer Toronto and North King made the river trip to-day; steamer Lamonde up from Clayton and intervening ports to-day; steamer Rideau Queen cleared for Ottawa this morning. At Folger's wharf—The steamer America left at five o'clock Saturday morning for Alexandria Bay to take an excursion among the islands and returned to the city, taking an excursion down among the Islands Saturday afternoon. The steam barge Water Lily passed up on her way west, following the Alexandria. M.T. Co's elevator—Steamer Canadian arrived from Fort William with a cargo of 72,000 bushels of wheat and transhipped it to barges here. She cleared again for Belleville to load cement. The Hall arrived from Montreal with four light barges; steamer Stormount passed up with a cargo of rails from Sydney to Fort William; tug Hall leaves to-day with three grain barges for Montreal; tug Emerson is due to-night with two coal barges from Charlotte. The steamer Geronia had an awful time on Lake Huron last Monday afternoon and night, during the big gale. Passengers and crew became awfully sick, and those in the fire-boat were rendered almost helpless. Steam ran down, and one of the passengers had to assist in keeping up the fire so as to supply power to the boat. Capt. Hoffman never left the bridge for fifteen hours, till the vessel was safe in port at Tobermory. He was given a tangible recognition by the passengers. The Geronia is of light draught, so as to run the St. Lawrence, and not intended for the rough upper lake route. She will run from Toronto to Quebec. This is her maiden trip from the shipyard. A Creditable Showing.
