LOUD TALK OF MONEY.

The United States postal service has passed through a similar experience. It was running behind many millions a year. The outlook was alarming. There seemed to be no hope of ending the shortages except by cutting off some of the rural mail free deliveries.

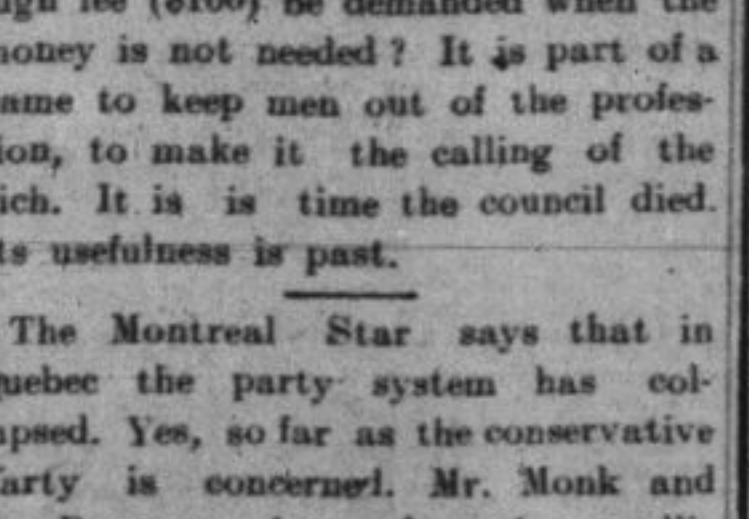
