**A RESIDENT OBJECTED IN MARINE CIRCLES**

TO THE OLD BOYS' ARCH COMING DOWN AT 4 A.M.

The Police Were Called, But They Found They Had No Authority to Stop Early Morning Labor.

The old boys' arch at the corner of Clarence and King streets was taken down on Thursday. The men in charge of the paving operations on the block below asked two days ago, that it be removed, as it interfered with their work. One of the foremen declared that if the city did not take down the arch, he would have to put his own work and fear it down. The arch was so admirably that Ald. Carson declined to have it removed, but when it interfered with the road construction work, he gave orders to remove the decoration.

At 4 a.m., the firmen began to pull it down. While they were at work, a resident stuck his head out of a window and asked them to cease their labor until a more reasonable hour, so that the people could finish their sleep. The firmen said they were acting under orders, and wanted to complete the work before the middle of the day when it would be so hot. The resident then telephoned for the police to see if they could not force the arch-razers to return to their beds, but the "peelers" found there was no by-law under which they could act. So the work of pulling down the arch of course.

There is a noise by-law in force, but it does not apply to labor. If it did, work at drydocks, elevators and in other places would come under the ban. Evidently no distinction is made between work in the day or night in residential sections, as is the case in Germany.

STILL AT WORK ON THE BARGE DAVIE.

Schooner Katie Eccles Did Considerable Damage to Stern of Steamer Jessie Bain — Marine Notes Gathered Around the Harbor.

The steamer Jessie Bain, which was run into by the schooner Katie Eccles, on Wednesday, suffered a good deal of damage, to her stern, and will have to undergo extensive repairs.

The schooner Katie Eccles was coming into Folger's wharf, to unload a cargo of coal for the Thousand Island Steamboat company, when the accident occurred.

The steamer America was held up in the canal, and as a result it was one o'clock this morning, when the vessel arrived back from its trip to Iroquois.

The barge Davie, of the Montreal Transportation company, which went aground, and was sunk at Alexandria Bay, has not yet been raised. The Calvin company is still at work on the scene.

The steamer Missisquoi was up from Gananoque, to-day.

The steamer Buma Vista will arrive from Smith's Falls, tonight.

The schooner Kewatin, unloading coal, at the penitentiary, cleared for Oswego.

M.T. Co's elevator.—The steamer Gordon cleared for Belleville, to load cement for Fort William; the tug Thomson cleared for Montreal, with three grain barges; the tug Emerson, from Charlottetown, with three coal barges; tug Barlett, from Port Dalhousie, with oil barge No. 86; tug Barlett cleared for Montreal, with three grain barges; the steamer Turret Cape, grain-laden from Fort William, is due to arrive to-morrow, to discharge.
