WATER CONTAMINATED

HEALTH OFFICER ADVOCATES FILTRATION PLANT.

The City Council Will Have to do Something to Improve the Water Supply—The Board of Health Will Urge Action.

Dr. A. R. B. Williamson, medical health officer, was asked, on Tuesday, regarding the condition of the city's water supply. He replied that, on some days the water was all right for drinking, after receiving the chlorine treatment, and on other days it showed signs of colon bacilli, notwithstanding the treatment it received.
