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**DIXIE DID NOT ENTER THE SPORT REVIEW****THE SECOND OF THE GOLD CUP MOTOR RACES.**

Mit II. Won, With a Speed of 33.9 Miles an Hour—Toronto Motor Boat Ran on a Shoal Near Gananoque.

Gananoque, Aug. 10.—The second race at Round Island in the gold challenge cup series attracted another large crowd from Gananoque, yesterday afternoon. The result was, however, a disappointment to many of those who went as neither Dixie IV nor Hornet were in the race. The race scheduled for 3 p.m. was not started until four, at which time the river was dotted with craft of all kinds. Almost before the sound of the starting gun had died away, Mit II, in a burst of speed, shot across the line, followed a half minute later by Wasp, followed by Skipper. This position remained unchanged, Mit crossing the line for the first round at 4:14; Wasp, 4:15; Skipper, 4:15:30. The second round was finished: Mit, 4:27; Wasp, 4:28:30; Skipper, by a mishap being put out of action. The third round was finished by Mit at 4:40 and by Wasp, 4:42, and the final by Mit at 4:53, Wasp, 4:56, making a speed for the race of 33.9 miles an hour for Mit and 32.1 for Wasp.

Dixie and Hornet will be in the race to-day, when the crowd, it is expected, will be larger than ever. Mit represents the Thousand Island Yacht Club, Wasp the Thousand Island Park Yacht Club, and Skipper the Chippewa Yacht Club.

On passing out of College, Cadets

Successful candidates will join the Royal Naval College at Halifax in October next; the course will last for two years and the cost to parents, including board, lodging, uniform and all expenses, is approximately \$200 for the first year and \$250 for the second year.

On passing out of College, Cadets

will be rated Midshipmen and will receive pay as such.

Parents of intending candidates

should make application to the Secretary Civil Service Commission, Ottawa, before October next.

**A YOUNG MAN DROWNED**

AT BREWER'S MILLS ON THURSDAY MORNING.

Joseph McLaughlin, of Sutton, Nebraska, Was the Victim—He Fell Out of a Rowboat While Fishing.

Joseph McLaughlin, of Sutton, Nebraska, was drowned at Brewer's Mills, up the Rideau, about ten o'clock on Thursday morning. He was in a row boat, having gone out with the intention of fishing. His cousin had left him a while to go to a boat house for something, and did not witness the accident. It is supposed he fell out of the boat.

The steamer Reidant King, en route

from Kingston to Ottawa, was pass-

ing at the time, and a deck hand

from the steamer jumped into the

water and tried to effect a rescue.

He was carried down by the drowning young man, and had to let go his hold. The Nebraska boy drowned

before further efforts to aid him could

be given. The body was not recovered

for half an hour, as it was carried

along for some distance by the action

of the moving steamer.

The deceased was about nineteen

years of age, and was on a visit to

his uncle, William Deane, of Brewer's

Mills. He had just arrived there on

Tuesday evening, having gone from

Barriefield, where he had visited at

the home of another uncle, James

McLaughlin, of Sutton.
