## THE TORIERS WANTED IT

THEY WOULD HAVE SOLD CANADA YEARS AGO.

Says William Robinson, ex-M.P.—They Declared for Annexation at a Meeting in Ontario Hall, Kingston.

William Robinson, ex-M.P.P., who is in his eighty-seventh year, was down town on Wednesday to get some pointers on the political situation, and also to view the permanent road construction. Beyond being a little weak in the legs, Mr. Robinson is otherwise in good health.

Mr. Robinson thinks that Canada would be quite safe in arranging a little reciprocity with the United States. He says that when Sir John A. Macdonald, the king of conservatives, made reciprocity a plank in his platform in 1891, the present generation need not be at all afraid. The crisis now, he says, are simply offering the people what the Tories tried to get years ago, but failed.

"This talk of annexation is all rubbish," declared the veteran politician. "I can tell you something about annexation, and it was not the liberals who suggested it either. I remember when a young man that a meeting of Tories from all over Upper and Lower Canada was called to convene in Kingston just after the parliament buildings in Montreal were burned. Three from every constituency attended, and the meeting was held in the present Ontario hall, in the city buildings. At that time, the large majority of the representatives spoke in favor of annexation to the United States. I was in the hall and heard the speeches, and was disgusted. Finally Ogilvie R. Gowan arose and declared that the only annexation he would stand for would be the annexation of the United States to Canada under the Union Jack. He declared the annexation of Canada to the United States was a disgrace, and they took me by the scruff of the neck and threw me out of the hall. The next morning, the Stars and Stripes floated from the southern flagpole of the town buildings, where it had been nailed by Tories, but was severed when he ordered the town marshal, who said he would train a gun on it if it was not taken down."

**HAD A NARROW ESCAPE.**  
William Smith Injured in Auto Accident.

With his arm and shoulder in splints William Smith, the automobilist, who was thrown from his machine near Collins Bay, Monday evening and fractured his shoulder, was out on the street, to-day, and said he would be back in the machine again as soon as his arm would permit. While travelling at a good rate of speed he lost control of his machine for an instant and it crashed into a fence alongside the road. The force of the impact threw him out of the machine and carried the windguards away. He alighted on his left shoulder and fractured it. Wednesday morning he was looking for a machine which he could control and steer with his right hand.
