HERE'S A MYSTERY

FIEND TRIES TO BURN LONELY OLD WOMAN.

Aroused From Sleep by Stifling Smoke, She Breaks From Barred House in Time to Escape Flames.

Allentown, Pa., Aug. 16.—All of Lehigh county's detectives and many other officers are endeavoring to unravel the mystery of an attempt made last night to incinerate Miss Eliza Nonnemacher, living near Lehigh Furnace. Miss Nonnemacher, who is a single woman, fifty years-old, was for a long time housekeeper for John Schlicher, whose property she inherited when he died last spring, since which time she lived alone.

About midnight she was awakened by a smell of smoke. On attempting to open the windows she found they had been nailed shut, and when she tried to open the door discovered, to her horror, this had also been nailed from the outside. Made desperate by danger, she finally tore the door open, an in her night clothes rushed into the open air through flames that shot ten feet high.

She fought the blaze single-handed until her cries brought the neighbors to her relief. It was found that the fire had placed a bag of straw saturated with kerosene against the door and set it afire.

DEATH OF W. A. HUNGERFORD.

A Well-known Resident of Belleville and Hastings.

Madoc, Aug. 16.—William A. Hungerford died suddenly here yesterday morning of hemorrhage of the heart. On Saturday he was taken ill while at his tale mine at Eldorado and a speedily as possible was conveyed to his home. Deceased was born in the northern part of Ireland, but had resided in Belleville and Hastings county the greater portion of his life. He was at one time in business in Madoc and was also much interested in mining matters in the northern part of the county. Since 1866, when the Richardson gold mine was discovered, Mr. Hungerford had more or less to do with mining gold, arsenic, pyrites and recently tale. The deceased was for a few years a resident of Belleville, being then engaged as a traveller for a large mercantile firm. In 1896 and 1897 he was a member of the city council. Mr. Hungerford was a member of the Anglican church, of the Masonic fraternity, and also belonged to the Independent Order of Foresters. In politics he was a conservative. For the past thirteen years he had been residing in Madoc.

THEY FAVOR IT.

The Canadian Manufacturers and the Fact. London Advertiser. The number of manufacturers coming out strongly and publicly in favor of the pact is a striking feature of the campaign. There were Messrs. MacLaren, Gill and Lyle, of Brockville, the last a prominent miller. D. B. Wood, of Hamilton, comes forward, a leader in the milling industry which some anti-reciprocity journals for fishery suppose will be injured. Mr. Wood cannot see it that way. H. T. Bush, head of Port Hope's largest industry, declares that what is good for the farmers is also for the manufacturers' interests. Mr. Maxwell, of St. Marys, an implement manufacturer, does not see how any manufacturer can oppose the agreement. John Cair, of Osoit, Shapely & Muir, Brantford, is a strong reciprocity supporter. It is the same way with Gordon McGregor, manager of the Ford Motor company, at Walkerville; Dr. Sylvester, mayor of Preston; N. H. Stevens, president of the Canada Flour mills company; John Tiggott, of Chatham, etc. Sir John Macdonald used to urge that protection for manufacturers would create a home market for the farmers. Certainly the manufacturers can see that enlarged markets, enriching the farmers will make the home market better for manufacturers.

The Farmer's Opportunity.

In reply to the Montreal Herald's slogan: "Let the farmer have his turn," the Hamilton Spectator asks what else he has been having for several years past. The opportunity to pay the additional price which protection demanded for the manufactured article he used, Mr. Spectator, without the opportunity to market his produce where it would bring the highest price. Yes, Mr. Spectator, the farmer has been having his chance to help enrich the packing mergers. What he wishes now is an opportunity to make a little legitimate profit for himself.

A Bumper Apple Crop.

According to the official forecast of the International Apple Shippers' Association, the United States and Canada will have a bumper apple crop this year, exceeding last year's crop by at least thirty-five per cent., or 5,200,000 barrels. Of the four big commercial states, New York shows an increase of fifty per cent. over last year, Pennsylvania, thirty-five per cent., and Michigan, 150 per cent. The eastern section of Canada shows an increase of at least 100 per cent.

WAS NEVER BAPTISED

WHY CATHOLIC CHURCH RECOGNIZES THE MARRIAGE.

Got No Dispensation—Story That She Paid Large Sum For This Purpose Denied.

Paris, Aug. 16.—As it is apparent that a controversy has arisen concerning the status of the marriage of Mme. Eames de Gorgora, the latter, to Emilia de Gorgora, the baritone, the statement is made on authority here that in the eyes of the church neither had ever been married before. Mme. Eames was never baptized, and as a consequence she is looked upon as an infidel. Such being the case, her first wedding is not regarded as binding. For this reason she was entitled to embrace Catholicism and marry Gorgora. The latter, it is pointed out, was married previously by a magistrate, and the ceremony is not recognized by the church. In view of all this, the attitude is taken that the church is concerned only with the marriage of Eames and Gorgora which was celebrated on July 7th last. The report that Mme. Eames paid a large sum for a dispensation is untrue.
