Harold Davidson, aged twenty-one years, died at Smith's Falls, on Saturday, after a couple of days illness.

WHAT KILL THE EXCURSION BUSINESS.

Canadian Vessels Not Allowed to Take Passengers From U.S. Ports.

Detroit, Aug. 18.—The United States department of commerce and labor, yesterday, issued a circular letter to all collectors of customs on the great lakes calling attention to the law which forbids Canadian excursion vessels from transporting passengers from American ports to Canadian ports or from Canadian ports to American ports and back.

The law provides a penalty of \$200 to be paid by the steamship company for each passenger so carried.

The matter was called to the attention of the department by the collector at Rochester, N.Y. Enforcement of the law will break up a flourishing excursion business now carried on by Canadian steamship companies on the lakes.

POLITICS AT EXHIBITION.

Toronto Tories Would Introduce an Annexation Hodge.

Toronto, Aug. 18.—Will the Canadian National Exhibition be used to exhibit the American annexation hodge in order to defeat reciprocity and to promote the interests of certain Tory politicians? The Globe asks.

Information has been communicated to that paper that a plan has been proposed in influential circles to have an American speaker at one of the directors' luncheons discuss reciprocity.

It is thought that with deliberate intent advocates of political union as the result of free trade.

THE TONIC OF VICTORY.

Army Surgeons Say It Acts as an Anesthetic.

Bonnetts, a French army surgeon, attached to the 39th Artillery, writes in the Presse Medicale of the extraordinary indifference to the pain of operation manifested by the soldiers of Napoleon, while the great conqueror was sweeping victoriously over Europe. While the defeated soldier is full of imaginary terrors, subject to panic, madness and treason, the conqueror on the other hand is intoxicated with success, says the New York Medical Journal. Nothing, even the morbid microbes, can resist troops who believe themselves to be invincible.

Victory is the most powerful of restoratives and the deepest anesthetic. Legless members of the Old Guard crowding into an ambulance would at sight of the emperor rise on their stumps to salute him. After Eylau Lartey operated uninterruptedly for thirty-six hours, and he reports how the soldiers seemed unconscious of their own troubles, lost in thought of the glory of their leader, and maimed as they were lending their best to follow to salute him. After Borodina, Lartey disarticulated the shoulder of a colonel, who immediately set out for France on foot, where he arrived after three months' walking. After Jorzing the Berezina, a river in Russia, Gen. Zayonchek, seventy-five years old, had his knee-cap shattered by a bullet, amputation was performed in three minutes in a violent snowstorm and in bitterly cold weather, yet the white-haired officer was placed in a sledge and taken to
