## SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

AN PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE head of a family, and is not more than 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The Canadian Land Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by a son, daughter, son's wife, son's daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

A homesteader may make his residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a claim of 160 acres, and occupy him by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may preempt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price, \$125 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the claim or on homestead six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to clear the land). Rent and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a homestead in certain districts. Price, \$125 per acre. Duties—Must reside in each of three years within fifteen acres and a house worth \$200.00.

## Canadian Vessels Not Allowed to Take Passengers From U.S.

PORTS.

Detroit, Aug. 18.—The United States department of commerce and labor, yesterday, issued a circular letter to all collectors of customs on the great lakes calling attention to the law which forbids Canadian excursion vessels from transporting passengers from American ports to Canadian ports or from Canadian ports to American ports and back.

The law provides a penalty of \$200 to be paid by the steamship company for each passenger so carried.

The matter was called to the attention of the department by the collector at Rochester, N.Y. Enforcement of the law will break up a flourishing excursion business now carried on by Canadian steamship companies on the lakes.
