Three of the women in the case were sisters, Crickett, Dorcas and Ellen Cockren, and they were shown to be the mothers of sixteen of his children, in addition to his five natural children.

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DOCTORS' TRUST.

Uniform Schedule Adopted for Births and Amputations.

The schedule of rates of the doctors' trust of Manchester, Conn., has been made public.

For officiating at the birth of a child the fee will be \$15, but if the lady cares anything about bargains she will be interested to know that twins will cost her only \$5 more. There are no rates fixed so far for triplets. Boys will cost as much as girls.

As Manchester is a silk manufacturing centre the schedule includes amputations. There will be a charge of \$10 for cutting off one finger or toe, but if the victim is economic he might have either two toes or two fingers amputated, for it will cost only \$5 extra for a pair.

Examinations of insane persons will cost only \$5 each. Telephone calls for advice will cost 50¢, trolley and railroad cases at least \$5, and when the physician finds two patients in one home he will treat the second one for 75¢.

A friend of Mrs. McCullough's said that her will provided that the estate shall be held in trust during the lifetime of Mr. McCullough, his two sisters, and Mr. and Mrs. Hiram V. Reed, father and mother of the dead writer. Each is to be paid a monthly sum and at their death the entire fortune is to be divided equally among the institutions named in the will.
