MIX-UP OF NEUTRALS. THEY ARE NON-COMBATANTS, SAYS W. T. STEAD.

The London Editor Says That Sir Wilfrid Laurier Should Easily be Returned to Power. London, Aug. 19.—W. T. Stead, writing in the Review of Reviews, says there has been a good deal of somewhat wrong-headed discussion in the English and South Africa papers as to the precise degrees of liberty asserted at the imperial conference meetings for the colonies in time of war.

The misunderstanding is entirely due to the mistaken use of the word "neutral" by Sir Wilfrid Laurier. His first declaration on the subject was made to me just after the floor war. He used the words "light they pointed out that according to international law no part of the British empire could be neutral when the empire was at war, and that if he wished to be neutral he would have to declare the independence of Canada. His reply showed that he did not mean neutral in merely non-combatant. He said: "Of course, we might be attacked and I we were attacked we should have to defend ourselves, but if we held our hands off the war I do not think we should be neutral."

STOWAWAYS. Make Themselves Obnoxious in the Canadian Liners.

With the opening of the St. Lawrence navigation, the migratory individual, the stowaway, begins to make himself obnoxious to the masters and officers of the Canadian liners. The trend of western emigration from Great Britain and the continent is Canada-wards, and to the ne'er-do-well, the loafer, and sometimes, the unfortunate, the idea of getting out to a country where everything seems to be prosperous, and where everyone is going, looks good.

Florence Nightingale Status. The memorial in England to Florence Nightingale is to take the form, first of a statue to be placed where all may see it, perhaps in Pall Mall, opposite to the Crimean Memorial; next, a fund to provide annuities (to be known as Florence Nightingale annuities) for trained nurses who, while devoting the best years of their lives to following their vocation, have been unable to provide adequately for their old age or infirmity.

Suitor Has Disappointment. The Marquis of Northampton, who has celebrated his sixty-first birthday, is a Knight of the Garter, and one of the biggest landlords in London, owning extensive properties in the Clerkenwell district. He is well-known as a philanthropist, and takes great interest in various religious enterprises. He is not fond of politics, but is a keen student of the social problem of the day, and is an accomplished musician and a great lover of art.

Bricks They Use In London. Something less than a century ago there used to be a tax on building bricks in England, and in order to evade it the bricks were made of larger and larger size. These were used for cellars and other concealed places. To stop this fraud an act was passed in the reign of George III, fixing the legal size of bricks. Early in Queen Victoria's reign the tax was taken off, and bricks may now be legally made of any size whatever. But any change from the standard size would bring about great inconvenience. All calculations are made for building on this standard size, and the London building acts have practically fixed it at 9 by 4 1/2 by 3 for all time.—London Standard.

Will Be Grand Affair. The ball which the Duchess of Sutherland will give in June will be a very important social function, for the King and Queen have notified their intention to be present. For this reason the ball, which is to celebrate the debut of Lady Rosemary Leveson-Gower, the only daughter of the Duke and Duchess, is to take place on the night following the Coronation Day, instead of Coronation Day itself, as at first contemplated. Most of the royal and other distinguished guests then in England are expected to be present.

Manuel Plays Golf. King Manuel of Portugal, who now it will be remembered, lives at Richmond, has developed a great liking for golf, and plays on the Mid-Surrey Club links. He also goes in for rowing. He is extremely nice to all with whom he is brought into contact, so it is said, and is very popular.

DEATH AND THE EDITOR. Why the Papers Have to Get Obituaries in Advance.

"Deaths of great men should remind us. Cut and lives to keep in stock. Let their sudden passing find us. Missing forms at two o'clock." Had Longfellow been the telegraph editor or city editor of a metropolitan daily, his "Psalm of Life" would probably have opened with some such verse as that given above. To the person unacquainted with the exigencies of newspaper work, there is at first thought something cold-blooded and gruesome, if not positively ghastly, at the idea of a prominent citizen's obituary being prepared when he is overtaken by serious illness and kept standing a type, ready to shove into the form the moment his death is announced, while at the latest possible minutes each night his house, his doctor or his hospital, as the case may be, is called up with an enquiry as to his condition. Bitter reflection, however, will probably convince the average reader that this state of preparedness is infinitely preferable to leaving this work until the subject has actually expired, for it is certainly much better to have an accurate, dignified and well-illustrated biography written at leisure and with opportunity for revision and verification, than an incomplete, hastily-composed and possibly erroneous sketch, rushed off at a moment's notice from material secured either from an un-illustrated source, or from other disgraced relatives or poorly-informed members of the family.

Remarkable Operation Helped Child. New York, Aug. 21.—Paralysis that has existed since birth was partially relieved by an unusual operation performed in White Plains upon nineteen-months-old Francis J. O'Leary. The infant rallied from the operation and is now fairly on the road to recovery. At birth the child suffered a depression of the skull, which caused a complete paralysis of one side of the body and a paralysis of the brain. The operation consisted of the removal of a piece of bone equivalent to one-fourth of the entire skull, which was pressing upon the brain.
