Supposed to be Work of a Black-hand Society. Charlottetown, P.E.I., Aug. 23.-This town is greatly excited over the finding last night, of the body of George Ling, a Chinaman, who adopted Canadian customs and nationality, on the beach here. He was apparently murdered for his money, and jewelry by some Chinese Black-Hand Society. Ling disappeared in July. He was a prominent citizen and much respected.
