## THE WORLD'S EPISODES

### GIVEN IN THE BRIEFEST POSSIBLE FORM.

Matters That Interest Everybody—Notes From All Over—Little of Everything Easily Read and Remembered.

Thomas Gibbs Kidour, Toronto, died Tuesday morning.

John D. Rockefeller has given another \$1,000,000 to the Rockefeller Institute of Medical Research, New York.

To prevent treason and revolution when they grow up, three military boys are receiving military instructions from the Russian government.

Gus Ellmer, a demented man, tried to climb into the lion's den at East Park Zoo, Chicago, yesterday, and had both arms stewed off. He was alive when rescued.

Dr. Henry K. Kerr, a well-known physician of Watertown, N.Y., died suddenly, Tuesday, of asthma, and heart failure, aged fifty-two years. He had been in the city for some time.

The Kaiser has issued an order forbidding any member of the imperial family heretofore acting as theatrical "artist." Berliners are wondering who has been "stung."

There will be fourteen thousand polling places in connection with coming general elections and it will cost the country three-quarters of a million dollars to take the vote of the people.

The home committee expenditures in the post office department, Washington voted to investigate charges of "pernicious political activity" against Fred Greiner, Postmaster at Buffalo.

Traffic on the Canadian canals to the end of July shows seventeen million tons as against twenty-one million tons last year. The decrease of four million is largely accounted for by the St. Lawrence canal not handling so much ore as last year.

A number of post offices in Northern New York will be designated as postal savings banks in the near future. Alexandria, Fay, Canton, Carthage, Clayton, and Ogdensburg, are among the places already designated.

A dispatch to the Boston Transcript states that the treasury department is contemplating the consolidation of the custom houses at Ogdensburg and Cape Vincent with the Oswego office.

This would mean that the two offices first named would be abolished.

Admiral Togo left Niagara Falls, aboard the private car "Canaan" on Monday, after spending two days with in hearing distance of the mighty character. He said before leaving that he was much impressed with the beauty of the falls and the wonderful power development. He was much interested in the Hydro-Electric scheme.

That the Laurier government will come back at least four seats stronger from Western Canada is the conviction of a member of the Toronto Star editorial staff, just returned from a trip to Victoria. In every one of the four western provinces the hatred of larger markets for Canadian produce is likely to result in the gain of one or more seats for the liberal party.

## TWELVE ACTORS

To Use Islands for Natural Stage Scenery.

Alexandria Bay, N.Y., Aug. 23.—Twelve motion picture actors of a film company are at the Crossman house. It is their intention to be at the islands for three weeks, and to carry with them, when they leave here, a medley of interesting little outdoor motion picture plots that will bring the busy city workers back from the humdrum of every-day business to the scenes of their summer vacations.

Each day the motion picture people will journey to islands near here, where the plots and counterplots of the playrights will be carried out with befitting scenery.

New York Woman Wins Contest at Country Club.

Alexandria Bay, N.Y., 23.—Mrs. A. G. Miles, New York, won the putting and approaching contest for women on the links of the Thousand Island Country Club, Mrs. I. H. Jenney, also of New York, was second. E. S. Rees, of New York, won first prize in the men's contest. Mr. Douglas was second. The contest concluded the annual golf tournament.

The women of the club are playing all this week for the special cup put up by Mrs. Rafferty and Mrs. Peacock, to be won twice before being taken away.

## Irishmen Replace Frenchmen.

Montreal, Aug. 23.—A serious breach is threatened between the Catholic Order of Foresters and the 22,000 Quebec French-Canadians belonging to the organization as a result of the replacing of two French-Canadians in the supreme council of the order by two Irishmen at the international convention, which was held at Cleveland, Ohio, last month. The local French-Canadian Foresters are greatly worked up over the matter.

## Did a Woman Take It?

Paris, Aug. 23.—Not since the Dreyfus trial has Paris been so excited about any crime as to-day regarding the stealing of the masterpiece, "Mona Lisa," from the great national collection at the Louvre. This show place is closed to-day while detectives throng the buildings. It is thought that a woman, disguised as a workman, was the thief.

the honor of being prime minister. No one can offer me any honor equal to that. The one honor left to me will be to retire and become a simple citizen of Canada.

Sir Wilfrid pointed out the difference between Mr. Bourassa's attitude when speaking to English people in Lachine and to French people in rural parts. He was a lion in St. Eustache and a lamb at Lachine. He quoted from the Montreal Gazette, which he termed a "silly journal," to substantiate these differences. Sir Wilfrid brought out the fact that a vote for Bourassa was a vote for Borden and a \$25,000,000 contribution to England, a tribute to be paid into the strong boxes of London.

The Laurier programme was one of a navy under control of the Canadian parliament, to fight only when the government approved of it.

There was an entente between Mr. Bourassa and Mr. Borden, not, perhaps, signed and sealed, but existing nevertheless. In Ontario Laurier is attacked as an anti-imperialist, in Quebec Bourassa attacks him for being too imperialistic.

"Four days ago in Toronto," said the premier, "Mr. Bristol of Toronto, a Tory of Tories, addressed an audience in that city, and, to quote the Gazette, he flayed the prime minister for showing he was not imperial enough; and 'yet,' said Mr. Bristol, 'these are the men in whose hands the destiny of Canada is entrusted. In what we are not fighting the liberal party, we are fighting Laurier and Borden.'"

"I repeated it in the House of Commons, I say it again here: I am not imperialist, I am not anti-imperialist; I am Canadian first and always, and there is my only policy. That is the policy I have maintained for fifteen years of liberalism, and it is my policy to give justice to all."

## TO REDEEM EAST HASTINGS.

Reeve Clarke Nominated by Great Liberal Convention.

Belleville, Ont., Aug. 23.—One of the largest and most enthusiastic liberal conventions ever held in the riding of East Hastings was that which took place in the village of Iveset. It was for the purpose of nominating a candidate to oppose W. B. Northrup, ex-M.P. Every polling subdivision of the extensive riding was represented.

The election of officers resulted as follows: President, Dennis Handley, reeve of Tyendinaga township; president, William Cross; secretary, James Clark. Vice-presidents were selected from the various municipalities in the riding, who with the officers, compose the executive.

The selection of a candidate was next proceeded with. Those nominated were Messrs. P. P. Clarke, of St. Ola; N. Vermilyen, reeve of Thurlow; J. Dale, Mayor, Thomas McEann, Tweed, E. J. Butler and J. K. McCarger, of this city. All retired in favor of Mr. Clarke, whose nomination was made unanimous, amid much enthusiasm.

In accepting the nomination Mr. Clarke made a brilliant and telling address, expressing his confidence in Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his administration. Addresses were also delivered by all who were nominated.

The candidate is exceedingly popular in the riding. He is a merchant at St. Ola, reeve of Limerick township, and an ex-warden of Hastings county. His candidature is received with much pleasure by the liberal party, which enters the campaign with confidence of success.

## Fused Steel in Man's Pocket.

Mansfield Centre, Conn., Aug. 23.—A bolt of lightning threw itself into the hip pocket of Joseph Barrow, a farmer, as he was sitting in the kitchen of his home, last night. The bolt came into the house via the stove pipe and was attracted to Barrow's hip pocket by the presence there of an iron monkey wrench and a big jack-knife. It passed down his leg, burning him severely and then careened over the floor, upsetting a tub of water, and splitting a huge chopping block. In Barrow's pocket the end of the wrench and the handle of his knife were fused into a solid piece of steel.


