AT THE POLICE COURT ADOPTED BALLOT BOX

When arrested Herbert Davis, a stranger in this part of the country, had only seventy cents in his possession, but he was willing to take this amount and pay his fare on the railway as far as it would take him, and that would not be many miles out of Kingston.

But Davis had good reason for so doing, as Mayor Graham, who was on the bench, at the police court, on Thursday morning, gave him the option of spending his seventy cents in this way or going to jail for a month.

Davis was arrested for being drunk. He was before the court a few days ago, given a chance to leave the city, but did not go, and this was the reason that the court was rather severe on him.

"Why didn't you leave town when you got the chance?" the magistrate asked.

"Because I couldn't. I have a sore leg and cannot walk very well."

The sore leg did not prevent Davis from drinking, however. He was headed for Montreal as soon as he was allowed out of the court room. After his money has been spent he will have to do a "Tom" Longboat "stunt" for the rest of the journey unless he falls in with some good friends.

William Owens was also among the many who indulged yesterday. He came from Jones' Falls, but was willing to return—that is provided the court would give him the chance. He has been working with one of the construction gangs for the Canadian Northern railway, and so was given a chance. The court informed him that if he came up again he would be given a month in jail.

Patrick McKenna did not fare so well. Patrick was drunk and it was stated that on Tuesday night he had been given protection at the police station. The penalty was \$10 and costs, or twenty days.

A first appearance drunk was given a chance to make good.
