WEST LAND REGULATIONS. ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE head of a family or any male over 18 years old may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Furniture, The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-

Agency for the district. Entry by proxy

may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader. Duties-Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on mother, son, daughter, brother or

good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price, \$3.00 per acre. Dutles-Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a pur-chased homestead in certain districts. Price, \$3.00 per acre. Duties-Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$360.00.
