TO THE RETIRING CITY ENGINEER, H. B. R. CRAIG.

Resignation Accepted at Special Meeting of City Council Wednesday Afternoon—Three Applications for Position—A Batch of Communications Received.

At a special meeting of the city council, held at four o'clock, on Wednesday afternoon, the resignation of City Engineer H. B. R. Craig, was accepted and the board of works was given power to call for applications for the position.

Included in the list of communications read by the city clerk, were three applications for the position rendered vacant by Mr. Craig's leaving. They were from the present assistant city engineer, H. J. McClelland, E. R. Beckwith, a former city engineer, having the position before Mr. Craig was appointed, and George C. Wright, also of this city. These applications were referred to the board of works.

Mayor Graham presided at the meeting, and the other members present were Alds. Bailey, Carson, Couper, Clugston, Fair, Fraser, Hanley, Harrison, Kent, Litton, McCann, McArthur, Rigney, Ross, Shaw, and Toye.

The meeting, as the mayor explained to the members at the opening, had been called for the purpose of putting through a little business in regard to the debentures, for the raising of necessary funds for the new school. This matter was soon disposed of, and a batch of communications were then referred to the committee.

A by-law was passed, to borrow \$40,000 by the issue and sale of debentures for a school site and erection of a school house.

In moving the motion for the acceptance of the resignation of Engineer Craig, Ald. Rigney, chairman of the board of works, paid a warm tribute to the worth of Mr. Craig, in his capacity as engineer. He said that the board of works, and all the members of council regretted very much the fact that Mr. Craig had found it in his interest to sever his connection with the corporation, and he wished to place on record their warm appreciation of the valuable service he had rendered the city. He afterwards moved that the resignation be accepted, and his motion was seconded by Ald. Toye.

R. L. McLelland, assistant city engineer, asking to be promoted to city engineer.

George Wright, making application for the position of city engineer.

E. R. Beckwith, making application for the position of city engineer.

Alpheus A. Turcott and others, re walk east side Division street.

J. Hickey and others, re walk on Lower Albert street.

H. B. R. Craig, city engineer, tendering his resignation as city engineer.

As is the usual custom the chairman and the city engineer will be given power to act on the applications for removal of trees.

An invitation was extended to the officials and heads of departments of the city to attend the municipal congress in Chicago, but no action was taken.

Chief Armstrong was granted permission to attend the annual meeting of the International Association of fire chiefs, which will be held in Milwaukee, September 18th to 23rd. The city will cover all expenses up to \$50.

Chief Armstrong wrote the council asking for better fire protection at the House of Industry, and his letter was referred to the House of Industry committee. The chief referred to an inspection he had made of the institution, and is asking that some alterations be made so as to put the institution in better shape in case of a fire.

The board of works submitted a report, asking that a sub-committee, composed of the chairman, Ald. Rigney, Ald. Bailey and the city engineer be appointed to meet with the committee from the township of Kingston relative to the grading of Concession Road on the basis of equal costs. This report was passed.

Hughes, living near Princess street, were away some person raised the back windows and purloined a pair of scissors, white vest and some collars. Nothing else was taken.

LABORERS ARE SCARCE IN THE CITY AT THE PRESENT TIME. Builders Have Difficulty in Obtaining Help to Erect Buildings—Immigration to the West is the Cause. According to the statements of total contractors help is very scarce in the city at the present time. The laborers know this and are not very particular whether they work for low wages or not. In fact they would prefer not to work. A local resident who is building a barn told the Whig that he had offered a man a certain wage (and it was a good wage too) to work on the building, during the course of construction. The man threw up the job because he was asked to build a granary (about half a day's job) in addition to what he had agreed to do. This made things very uncomfortable for the man who was having the barn built, but after a search he located another man who was not so particular about how he worked. The local men say it is on account of the great immigration to the west that the help is so scarce. Men are going to the west all the time. True a number of them return but a much greater number go than return. At the present time the contractors count themselves lucky if they can hold the help which they have had with them one time knowing the difficulty in obtaining other.

A meeting of representatives of the Young People's Societies of the city has been called to meet next Tuesday evening in the Y.M.C.A. building to arrange to send delegates to the convention which will be held in Aylmer, Quebec, on September 12th. The ticket agent, not being well informed regarding the vocations for women, could not impart much information which would be of benefit to her. Her inquiry revealed the fact that the woman was alone in the world with two children, one about six years of age and the other a baby. She was a stranger in these parts, having come here to look for work, and not having been successful she was going to brave the wilds of the west in an endeavor to support herself and children who were dependent upon her. She purchased the ticket for herself, one and one child and risked the chances of finding a good job in the West of Canada.

FURTHER TESTS BEING MADE. Ald. Carson After Water Above the Sewers. In order to find out whether the water in the lake has been contaminated, Ald. Carson is having samples of water taken from above Rockwood asylum, and near the old mill-house. The samples will be examined by Queen's College experts he says, and the result will be known in due time. Ald. Carson states that so much has been said about the lake water being contaminated, that he has taken this means of finding out for the general public. There will be a meeting of the water works committee in the near future, but the date is not yet known.
