DUKES WERE HERE

THEY WERE ON BOARD THE YACHT CANTANIA.

Having a Look Over Kingston as They Passed Through—Enroute to Duke's Estate in the West.

The Duke of Sutherland, accompanied by Lord Desborough and Lord Charles Beresford, arrived in the city Saturday morning, in the former's handsome yacht, the "Cantania." They stopped in the city for a few hours and were greatly pleased with the appearance of the old historic place. They dropped anchor about ten o'clock, just off the locomotive works, and put off in a small motor boat to inspect the town. Accompanying them in the duke's private secretary. The trip west is for the purpose of making a settlement of the duke's tenants in the west.

The party intends stopping for a few days at Toronto to witness the exhibition, and will go on to Fort William. There they will forsake the yacht and travel by train to the duke's estate, near Calgary.

The party made a hurried trip here from New York and only stopped a few hours in Montreal. They came over from England on the steamer Olympic and the yacht was waiting for them at New York.

With a large crew the boat has been cruising in the Mediterranean sea since February. The yacht cleared for Toronto this afternoon.

Possesses Advantages.

The assistant clerk of the crown in chancery, at Ottawa, says that some of the new type of ballot boxes the invention of J. B. Waldron, Kingston, will be used, and the Ottawa Journal in discussing the box says: "The new ballot box, though simple in construction, seems to possess several advantages over the old. The cover of the old type of box was divided into two parts, one part used as a lid opening on hinges, the other part fixed with a slit through which the ballot was deposited. In the new box the lid covers the whole top of the box, locking on the side instead of on the top. The ballots will be deposited through a round hole in the cover instead."

LONDON MAYORS HOT AT ROYAL SLIGHT.

Heads of 28 Boroughs Not Given Knighthood, While Provincial Excultives Received That Honor.

London, Aug. 26.—London is divided into twenty-eight different boroughs each of which, so far as governmental organization is concerned, is really a city by itself, and at the head of each one is a mayor. These mayors are a very angry indeed, at King George V's coronation, that he knighthooded them during the recent coronation ceremonies, whereas the mayors of the various provincial cities he has visited since coronation day have received a knighthood apiece. The explanation given out from the lord chamberlain's office does not help things, either. A provincial mayor, it is pointed out, is really a mayor, and the mayor of a London borough, though called a mayor, is in fact only the chairman of a ward council. The London mayors have decided that it would make them ridiculous to voice a formal protest, but they are boiling mad, for all that.

BIG INCREASE IN IMMIGRATION.

During July 29,621 People Settled in Canada.

Ottawa, Ont., Aug. 26.—During the month of July there were 29,621 immigrant arrivals in Canada, 18,669 at ocean ports, and 11,012 from the United States. As compared with July of last year the increase is 600 per cent. For July last year the figures are 16,019 at ocean ports and 9,199 Americans. For the four months of the current fiscal year arrivals at ocean ports numbered 127,925, and from the United States 54,814, making a total immigration from April to July inclusive of 182,739. The corresponding months last year gave 160,872 at ocean ports and 51,699 Americans, making a total of 112,571.

The working of the reciprocity agreement may never be able to overcome these engendered hates.
