## DUKES WERE HERE

THEY WERE ON BOARD THE YACHT CANTANIA.

Having a Look Over Kingston as They Passed Through—Enroute to Duke's Estate in the West.

The Duke of Sutherland, accompanied by Lord Desborough and Lord Charles Beresford, arrived in the city Saturday morning, in the former's handsome yacht, the "Cantanian." They stopped in the city for a few hours and were greatly pleased with the appearance of the old historic place. They dropped anchor about noon, just off the locomotive works, and put off in a small motor boat to inspect the town. Accompanying them is the duke's private secretary. The trip west is for the purpose of making a settlement of the duke's tenants in the west.

The party intends stopping for a few days at Toronto to witness exhibition, and will go on to Fort William. There they will forsake yacht and travel by train to Duke's estate, near Calgary.

The party made a hurried trip here from New York and only stopped a few hours in Montreal. They came over from England on the steamer Olympic and the yacht was waiting for them at New York.

With a large crew the boat has been cruising in the Mediterranean since February. The yacht cleared for Toronto this afternoon.

## TWO GIRLS SAVED By Prompt Action of Young Men at Gananoque.

Gananoque, Aug. 26.—What might have been a very serious accident, has just been made public about town. The mishap occurred Wednesday afternoon, at the government pavilion, at Red Horse. Two young ladies from town, the Misses Bethia Sullivan and Rose Funnell were bathing. The former jumped from the boat into the water, and was followed by the latter, who struck the former and both sank. A young man named Halliday, who was near at hand, heroically plunged into the water and brought both ashore safely, where they revived in a few minutes.
