

FLAG WAVING SPEECH

DELIVERED BY R. L. BORDEN AT NAPANEE.

The Opposition Leader Fears That Lennox is in Danger of Being Captured by the Liberals.

Napanee, Aug. 28.—R. L. Borden wound up a strenuous week here, Saturday, with a vigorous wave-the-flag speech in the afternoon, before an audience of about eight hundred electors of Lennox and Addington gathered in the town's central park, surrounding the public library. Although the constituency has elected the veteran Uriah Wilson to parliament for nearly a quarter of a century past it has always been good fighting ground. Mr. Wilson is retiring from the strife of politics, and his place as standard-bearer for the party has been taken by W. J. Paul, M.P.P., for Addington. In 1898 Mr. Wilson won by 152 majority. CAR SHOT INTO AIR

THE PRESENCE OF MIND OF A VETERAN.

The Heroism of a Section Laborer—A Man Saved His Wife, Daughter and Himself.

Manchester, N.Y., Aug. 28.—Bad it has been for the almost miraculous presence of mind of Veteran Frank J. Pinner, in charge of U. S. Grant Post, G.A.R., Philadelphia, nine coaches would also have plunged into the lake at the awful wreck here on Friday. Quick as a flash, when he heard the first crash, Mr. Pinner leaped up and pulled the emergency brakes, it brought the coaches to a stop, quivering at the edge of the shattered trestle.

Captain and Mrs. Robert S. Hansbury, of No. 4108 Warren street, Philadelphia, were walking through the train to the dining car when the coach they had just entered shot into the air and they were dashed to the other end at the bottom of a heap of human beings and baggage.

Hansbury could see daylight beneath him through a window upon which he was resting. He broke the window with his fist and he and Mrs. Hansbury dropped into the stream, a few inches below, and crawled to safety, little injured.

Chester Goodwin, a Philadelphia man, grabbed a bundle rack over his head when he felt the car shaking beneath his feet and was thrown through a window, landing outside with slight injuries.

An act of heroism was enacted by a section laborer who was working near by and who refused to give his name. He smashed a window with his fist and drew out several passengers, who though injured were beneath a terrible weight and would have suffocated.

A husband in one of the ill-fated cars, who escaped, threw a rope to his wife from the top of the bridge and the woman was pulled up.

One of the most remarkable escapes was that of Louis H. Buell, of No. 839 Ellicot street, Buffalo, whose presence of mind not only saved himself, but his wife and daughter, aged eighteen.
