**RIFLEMEN AT RANGES**

**14TH P.W.O.R. WINS SECOND PLACE IN COMPETITION.**

Officers' Team is Placed Fourth in Borden Match—Maj. Dawson Well Up in Bisley Aggregate—Excellent Results.

The representatives of the 14th regiment, who attended the D.R.A. meeting at Ottawa, reached the city in the small hours of Sunday morning in high spirits, after a very successful, though strenuous, week on the Rock-cliff ranges. All the members of the team were placed in the prize lists during the competitions, and although the hopes entertained of having a representative of Kingston on the Bisley team for next year were not fulfilled, the successes obtained were very creditable.

Major H. J. Dawson enjoyed the distinction of being the one member of the Kingston contingent to obtain a place in the Bisley aggregate, his fine work at the long ranges will probably bring him into the first forty. Major Dawson also reached the highest position in any one match attained by a member of the team, being eleventh in the Dominion match, 600 and 800 yards. He was also placed in the Borden, 1,000 yards, and in the Macdougall and City of Ottawa Coronation matches.

W. E. Swaine was placed in the Macdougall, Dominion, City of Ottawa Coronation, Borden, and President's matches, besides doing very well indeed in the extra series competitions.

The tyro team, composed of Major H. J. Dawson, Capt. P. G. C. Campbell, Lieut. A. H. McGreer, Corp. G. Hooper and Pte. T. C. Stuart, very nearly succeeded in winning the Caron cup, the trophy for tyro teams from all over the Dominion. They were second only to the splendid team of the 6th D.C.O.R. from Vancouver and were ahead of the Queen's Own Rifles of Toronto and the 91st Highlanders of Hamilton. In the Borden match, the 14th team each at 200 yards and 600 yards, the officers' team of four, composed of Major Dawson, Capt. Campbell, Lieut. Birch and Lieut. Swaine, were placed fourth in the Dominion.

Pte. Stuart did particularly good work at the long ranges and got into the prize lists in the Dominion, City of Ottawa and Borden matches, and a tyro prize in the Governor-General's first stage.

Corp. Hooper was a prize winner in the Tyro match, the Macdougall, the City of Ottawa, and the Borden, and also secured a tyro prize for the first stage in the Governor-General's first stage.

Capt. G. T. Birch secured a win in the President's Rapid Fire match and in the Borden Active Service competition and Staff-Sergeant Skinner was well placed in the Macdougall at 600 and 200 yards.

Only two members of the team returned tyros viz. Capt. P. G. C. Campbell and Lt. A. H. McGreer each of whom secured three tyro prizes. Capt. Campbell had a very narrow escape from losing his tyro status, having twenty on score in the Borden match with a shot to go, when he unfortunately missed. Scores of twenty-four actually got into the regular prize list in the Borden.

Lt. A. H. McGreer had an accident to the rear sight of his rifle, which to some extent disabled him in several matches and probably prevented the tyro team from securing the coveted Caron cup.

The conditions throughout the meet were on all points considered very difficult. Mirage and tricky rear winds had to be dealt with every day and many of the most famous shots of the Dominion received bad falls in several matches.

Capt. Clifford, Corporal Trainor, Corp. Roberts and Lt. F. H. Morris were among the victims of the weather conditions at various stages of the competitions, Misses even, being not uncommon.

The Kingston Rifle Association was represented by John Barrett, who secured two tyro prizes, one in the Dominion match and one in the first stage of the Governor-General's match. Probably not one of the members of this year's Bisley team will reach a place in the team which goes to England next year.

During the week the annual meeting of the Canadian Rifle League was held. This organization organizes various competitions during the year, both in-door and out-door shooting on the ranges of the individual corps which are affiliated with it. In its report there are recorded several successes of the 14th Regiment, P.W.O.R. Rifles, which for its out-door shoots received its first class certificate, one of them being a special, these being obtained by Capt. P. G. C. Campbell and Staff-Sergeant Skinner. In the gallery shooting competitions conducted last winter, the 14th team was placed sixth in the Dominion and in the miniature competition, third.

The shots of the 14th P.W.O. Rifles are hoping that the success which has attended the two teams sent to the D.R.A. in 1910 and 1911, will have the effect of inducing many more members of the regiment to take up rifle shooting seriously, so that the regiment may take its place among the crack teams of the 6th D.C.O.R., of Vancouver; the Royal Grenadiers, of Toronto; the 43rd, of Ottawa, and others of the famous corps of Canada, and bring credit and renown to the old London city.

**Death of a Child.**

The death occurred on Tuesday morning, shortly after two o'clock, of Hazel Davis, aged eleven years, and seven months, daughter of William J. Davis, Ontario street. Deceased had been ill for about six weeks. The funeral will take place on Thursday morning, at nine o'clock, to St. Mary's cemetery.

The people also listened with great attention to short and timely addresses by Robert H. Fair, the reciprocity candidate in Frontenac and F. S. Ferguson, Inverary.

Benjamin Franklin, son of ex-Warden W. H. Franklin, of Joyceville, has been teaching school at Desert Lake, and it is stated that he has been an all-round teacher, learning the scholars the art of rowing, wrestling and running. In the rowing, he succeeded in getting the boys to beat their previous record by a good margin. Mr. Franklin has been doing good work at Desert Lake, but is leaving this term.

**Board of Education.**

There has been no meeting of the board of education called as yet, but the members will likely be called together, probably next week. There will be a meeting of the management committee of the board on Wednesday afternoon, when arrangements will be made for a vacancy on the staff. At a meeting of the board at the time of the appointment of Miss McCallum, as nurse for the schools, it was thought the opinion of the members that it would be a good thing to allow Miss McCallum to make a trip to Western Ontario, to study her work. This matter will be taken up at a meeting of the management committee.
