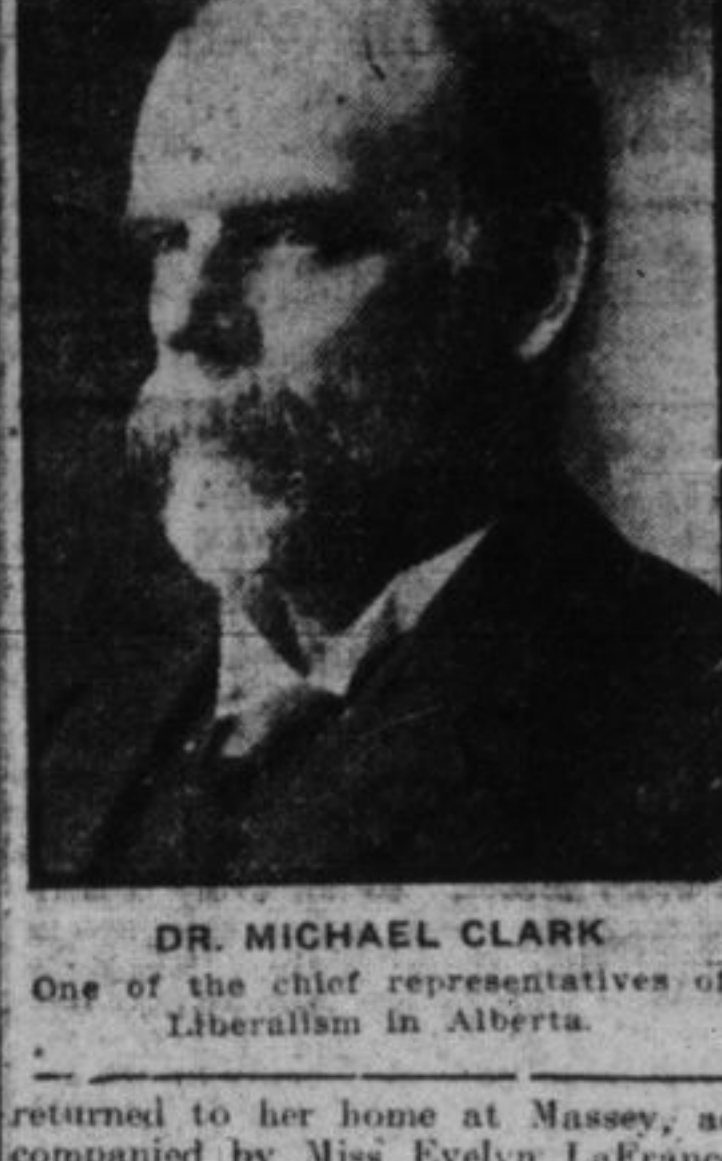

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ARE THESE DISLOYAL?

Because They Are Affiliated With U.S. Unions?

Seven thousand labor men, members of various trades unions, paraded in Toronto on Labor Day. Most of the unions were international in character, the membership extending over Canada and the United States. Are the Canadian members of these international unions disloyal? Does their devotion to Canada and their empire suffer from contact with their American fellow members? It must suffer if there is any force in some of the arguments that are used against reciprocity by those who are seeking to make it appear that Canadians are such a weak-kneed, spineless lot, that they cannot be trusted to have any dealings with their neighbors across the line. But there is no force in such a contention, and every member of an international union knows there is none. The disloyalty cry is raised for election purposes only; all the same, it is an insult to the membership of the international unions.

BAD CROPS IN GERMANY.

Great Fears Are Entertained for the Winter.

Berlin, Sept. 8.—The official crop report, made public yesterday, describes conditions throughout Prussia in very gloomy terms. The prolonged drought not only burned the crops, but also caused such a plague of field mice, larvae and other crop destroyers that great fears are entertained for the winter. The crops of potatoes and sugar beets are of the poorest, and fodder crops suffered so severely that owners are selling off their cattle, despairing to keep them through the winter. Pasturage has already partly or wholly given out.

Little progress has been made toward winter crops. The soil is baked so hard that ploughing is difficult and sowing impossible.

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and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within five miles of his homestead, but cannot obtain a farm of at least 20 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price, \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead

patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra. A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price, \$1.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
