Seven thousand labor men, members of various trades unions, paraded in Toronto on Labor Day. Most of the unions were international in character, the membership extending over Canada and the United States. Are the Canadian members of these international unions disloyal? Does their devotion to Canada and the empire suffer from contact with their American fellow members? It must suffer if there is any force in some of the arguments that are used against reciprocity by those who are seeking to make it appear that Canadians are such a week-kneed, spineless lot, that they cannot be trusted to have any dealings with their neighbors across the line. But there is no force in such a contention, and every member of an international union knows there is none. The disloyalty cry is raised for election purposes only; all the same, it is an insult to the membership of the international unions.
