DUTIES OF THE PRINCE

SON OF KING BROUGHT UP IN DEMOCRATIC MANNER.

Starts on Cruise as Ordinary Seaman and is Under Ship's Discipline.

London, Sept. 9.—No young man in England is being brought up in a more democratic manner or more forcibly taught to put aside his personal desires to attend to his duties than is the young Prince of Wales, and when he shortly starts out on a cruise on board the Hindustan he will be in every way treated like an ordinary midshipman. He has no cabin of his own, and when he gets on board he will have to dump his kit in the dog watch, steer his boat, land with despatches, attend to the other midshipmen. This list includes his professional books, his private reading, his personal stationery and the hundred and one articles which a healthy boy accumulates. He will be under ship's discipline, will take his turn in the dog watch, steer his boat, land with despatches, attend to the other midshipmen, and go through the whole round of instruction. His hours of work will be even longer than those of the other midshipmen, for as Prince of Wales, he will have to attend to important letters dealing with the management of his estates and scores of documents which will have to be read and signed by him personally.

When, therefore, the ship's mails reach the Hindustan, he will receive a message from the commander of the vessel, Capt. Campbell, who has been appointed his governor, and will report to the quarters of his superior, who will bring out the strong box in which his affairs are kept under lock and key. There will be a consultation the replies will be written, either by the prince or by the governor, and will be dropped into the mail bag and taken ashore to the telegraph office, as the case may be. Such of the correspondence will be carried on in London, without reaching the prince at all. But a good deal cannot be disposed of in this way, and the king desires that his son should feel the burden of responsibility in all reasonable ways.

In addition to whatever income the Prince of Wales receives privately, he is now the proud earner of one shilling and ninepence a day, which is his pay as a midshipman. Even this magnificent sum, however, is not all which he has to keep. His expenditure is deducted from each young officer for the naval instructor, who directs their studies.

Of all ranks, midshipmen are the only ones whose pay has never been raised, and, indeed, it is rather less nowadays than when in the rank was first instituted in the middle of the seventeenth century.

The prince has quickly shaken down into the ways of a modern man-of-war, and his fair to become very popular with his messmates.

NORTHERN NEW YORK STATE.

A Budget of News From Nearby Yankee Places.

The Syracuse state fair is now the only six day fair in the state. James Holder, aged 100 years, walked six miles to see the Barnum and Bailey show at Malone.

The hop yield of the state is estimated at 30,000 bales, which is 10,900 bales less than a year ago. High prices are assured.

The Ogdensburg fair and horse show will be held September 18th, 19th, 20th and 21st.

An outbreak of glanders has appeared among the horses of Ulster county and thirty have been isolated for observation.

Now that Waddington village has a regularly established ferry connecting it with the Canadian side a movement is on foot to make it a port of entry for immigrants, and it is William Tuller who took the first passenger train into Ogdensburg from Rome on July 4th, 1862, died in Rome recently, at the advanced age of eighty-seven years. He retired from "railroading" in 1872.

A motoring party passed through Ashville, Chautauque county, the other day, stopping long enough to set a basket containing a girl inside an open window at the home of Giles Brooks. There's no clue to the identity of any of the party.

An investigation may be made of the alleged laxity of the Alexandria Bay officials connected with the Lavin case. Lavin was arrested at the Bay on a charge of bigamy—and grand larceny committed in Menasha, Wis. He was held until Thursday morning, when he got out of jail and made off. The jail was locked and the windows barred in such a way that it is a mystery how he effected his escape.
