PUPILS FROM COUNTY

HAVE BEEN TAKEN AT COLLEGIATE INSTITUTE.

Sufficient room for the forty-three more is desired for city pupils—Increase in Fees.

The county pupils, who have made application for admission to the Collegiate Institute, will be admitted. This was decided upon, at a meeting of the management committee, of the board of education, held on Saturday afternoon.

However, while it was decided to take in the outside pupils such action was taken owing to the fact that there is, at the present time, sufficient room for the number who have made application, forty-three in all, the stipulation was made that if more room is required for city pupils, the county pupils must give way for them. At the present time, there is no sign of the outside pupils being disturbed.

In addition to making arrangements for the outside pupils, the committee also decided to raise the fees of the county pupils, from \$25 and \$30, to \$30 and \$35.

The outside pupils who were granted the permission to attend the collegiate, commenced their studies, on Monday morning. The pupils who had been barred from attending on the opening day, were naturally very much pleased, at the decision of the board. Many of them had taken up their residence here, and did not care to return after once getting settled.
