STORM ON THE LAKE

MARINERS WERE GIVEN A ROUGH NIGHT OF IT.

The Barge Winnipeg is in a Very Good Position to be Raised—Crew Were Able to Save Their Belongings—Marine Notes Around the Harbor.

Lake Ontario was visited by a severe storm, Thursday night, such as made all the marine men in this port sit up and take notice. It took all the skill the navigators on the different vessels possessed to bring their vessels safely to port. The storm started about midnight, but was brewing for a considerable length of time before that. The rain which fell in sheets, at times, was accompanied by a violent wind, which made it difficult for small vessels to keep on their courses.

The steamer Wolfe Islander had a stormy trip across Friday morning, and two attempts were made to make Swift's wharf before she was finally successful. She anchored next to the office instead of at the foot of Clarence street, on account of the shelter afforded.

The steamer City of Ottawa, which came down from Toronto, this morning, bore the brunt of the storm, all the way down. It began just as she cleared from Toronto, but she made the trip, in safety.

The boats in the harbor, were given a great shaking up. The schooner Albia L. Andrews, coal laden, at the Grove Inn, appeared to be in very bad shape, and arrangements were made to get her out of harm's way, if possible.

The steamer Buena-Vista, having to cancel her trip down the river, owing to the bad weather.

The steamship Jeska arrived from Oswego, coal-laden during the worst of the storm, this morning, but was compelled to go into shelter here.

At Swift's wharf: Steamer City of Ottawa stopped on her way down this morning, and discharged freight steamer Aletha was down from bay ports, to-day; steamer Toronto made the river trip to-day; steamer Lamonde was up from Gananoque and intermediate ports to-day; steamer Britannic was up from Montreal to-day with considerable freight and went back again.

It is stated that although there is eight feet of water over the barge Winnipeg, of the Montreal Transportation company, which was sunk near Rapid Du Plant, it is in fairly good shape to be pumped out, and raised. The accident occurred a quarter of a mile west of the head of Farra's Point canal. Capt. Nelson Mallette, and his crew managed to escape with all their belongings. Capt. Mallette has been navigating the river St. Lawrence for forty seasons, and this is his first wreck.

The schooner Katie Eccles, suffered damage in the same mishap as the schooner Major Ferry was in across the lake, a few days ago, and is here undergoing repairs. Her cargo of coal is for Booth & Co.

The steamer Sowards arrived from Oswego, with coal for Rockwood Asylum.

The barge Trush was towed to Kingston, from Charlotte, with coal for the Kingston & Pembroke railway.

M. T. Co's elevator—The tug Emerson cleared with one light barge, for Prescott and will return with oil barge No. 6, for Port Dalhousie.

ABERNETHY'S

CONSERVATIVE RALLY

WAS HELD IN SKATING RINK THURSDAY NIGHT

At Which Hon. Clifford Sifton Was the Chief Speaker—Dr. Ross, W. F. Nickle and W. R. Givens Spoke.

A meeting was held in the covered skating rink, on Thursday night, in the interests of W. F. Nickle, the conservative candidate, at which Hon. Clifford Sifton was the principal speaker. There was quite a large attendance. In addition to the addresses of Hon. Mr. Sifton, speeches were made by W. R. Givens, the president of the Conservative Association, who occupied the chair, W. F. Nickle and Dr. A. E. Ross.

Mr. Givens referred to Mr. Sifton as a converted liberal, and one of the strongest men in the Laurier government. He referred to the fact that Mr. Mowat had given a good deal of time in his address at the nominations in the city hall, criticizing the Kingston Standard, for the stand it had taken on reciprocity. He wished to say that the Standard stood for loyalty, and purity in government.

Dr. Ross characterized himself as a "false man" in the political arena. Hon. Clifford Sifton was a pioneer of the west, and as regards reciprocity, he should be in a position to know whether it would be good or bad for the country, he said.

W. F. Nickle said he felt it was his duty to jump into this election. He claimed that reciprocity was merely a bribe for the farmers in the offering of a few cents here and there. It was not a question of a few cents for the farmers, but this was the question: "Is Canada to be preserved for the Canadians?"

Mr. Sifton took the ground that it was not a question of markets or prices, but a question of Canada standing on her own feet. He claimed that an attempt had been made by the liberals, to drop the reciprocity question, and to make the entire issue a discussion on Bourassa. As regards reciprocity, Canada has built up a good home market, and also one in the old country. After all, foreign markets were of small account. The market of interest to the Canadian farmer was the market at home. Canada was at present very prosperous, and before there was any radical change, it should be given serious consideration.

Mr. Sifton claimed that no person knew just how the reciprocity agreement would work out. There were no dull times with Canadian industries; all the factories were running full time, and nothing should be done, which would tend to hurt the country. Canada had now developed into an important country, could be regarded as important as any of the other countries, and was well able to look after her own interests.

Mr. Sifton spoke for an hour and three-quarters, but Mr. Nickle was very brief. A number of conservative workers occupied seats on the platform.

A band was present and made things lively at times with their selections.

DUTY ENTIRELY REMOVED

On Quite a Number of Dried Fruit Articles -

Inquiry from a well-known wholesale grocer in the city upon the question of what dried fruits will have the duty entirely removed when the reciprocity pact is carried on Sept. 21st, revealed the following: On dried apples, pears, peaches and apricots the duty is entirely removed, and on raisins and prunes it is removed one-third, which places Canada in the same category as other favored nations.

This will mean much to the householders of the country for these fruits are used in abundance by households. The list of other wet fruits such as peaches, pears, etc., on which the duty is removed has been published before.

HUNTING SEASON IS OPENED.

Followers of the Gun May Roam Woods Now in Search of Game.

Friday, September 15th, marks the opening of the hunting season all over Canada and for the next three months those whose chief pastime is roaming the woods with a gun and dog, as companions, will be in their glory. Numerous game birds which previous years were open for attack from the first of the month were out of season until the middle this year. Many did not know this, although the game rules plainly say what shall be shot and what shall be not, and as a result several have been fined through ignorance of this recent law. Everyone will be free now to shoot anything in the feathered line until the season is closed.
