CHINESE FORCE May Arrive in Time to Rout the Rebels.

CONDITION CRITICAL

THE CITY OF CHENTU IN DANGER OF CAPTURE.

If it Falls the Missions Will be Lost, But the Missionaries May be Spared. London, Sept. 16.—The British minister at Peking cables the foreign office that he has received a telegram from the consul at Chung King, stating that the situation at Chentu is critical. The city is surrounded by thousands of rioters and fighting is going on. The rebels hold the roads, and are cutting within the walls of the city is feared because of the shutting off of the food supply. It is not doubted that the missions will be looted if the city falls, but it is expected that the missionaries may be spared, the rebels fearing penalties of violence toward foreigners and having before had a severe lesson.

London, Sept. 16.—The only news from China this morning is that the government is hoping that troops will reach Chentu in time to prevent the rebels doing much damage. The situation of the Canadian missionaries is still unknown.
