

CADETS HELD SPORTSAT ROYAL MILITARY COLLEGE,
SATURDAY AFTERNOON.Annual Aquatic Events Were Keenly
Contested—Weather Was De-
lightful—Cadet Rhodes Had
Shoulder Dislocated.

The athletes of the Royal Military College were in their glory Saturday afternoon last for that was the occasion when the annual aquatic sports were held, an event which is looked forward to from the time it is over one year until the time comes around the next fall.

The sports this year were up to the usual standard, which is and has always been the very top. In every movement, the cadets made their training apparent and the ease with which they performed feats of skill and endurance was much commented upon.

The quarter mile race was held Fri-

day afternoon and was won by Cadet Pittblado in very rough water.

Cadet Taylor was second, it had been intended to have the first heat of the war-canoe race take place Friday afternoon but the rough weather would not permit. The last heat will be run off some day this week.

Two events took place which were not on the programme. One was very ludicrous and the other rather serious. The first was when an unfortunate cadet was pushed off the wharf in full attire. Some of his fellow-cadets, by way of causing a little amusement, got behind him and heaved him into the cold water. The expression on his face when his head appeared above the water was most amusing for the others grouped around and the poor cadet caused more merriment than he intended.

The other was when the game of water polo was being played, at the last event of the afternoon. Cadet Rhodes who was goal-keeper for one of the teams, had the misfortune to have his shoulder dislocated. The game was stopped and he was taken to the dressing room, where his injuries were attended to.

Canoe doubles—MacNaughton and Smythe, in 4:0, Parker and Sparks.

In the first heat of the war canoe race "B" company won.

"C" company won the water polo contest.

After the sports tea was served in the gun room and the prizes were presented to the winners.

The officials of the sports were Referee, Lieut.-Col. J. H. V. Crowe; judges, Major J. P. Shine, Major F. R. Sedgwick and Capt. H. Kaulbach; starters, Lieut. M. V. Plummer and Lieut. F. A. Heymann.
