MEN FOR PARLIAMENT

REV. S. SELLERY SPOKE ON THE QUESTION

And Laid Down Great Broad Principles in Word of God—The Class of Men to be Selected.

Who are the men for our Dominion Parliament? Rev. S. Sellery asked this question, in Queen street church, Sunday night, and gave the answer in the text he chose for his able discourse. Exodus XVIII chapter, 21st verse: "Moreover, thou shalt provide out of the people, able men, such as fear God, men of truth, hating covetousness; and place such over them, to be rulers of thousands, rulers of hundreds, rulers of fifties and rulers of tens."

In his opening remarks, Rev. Mr. Sellery stated that a request had been sent out by the Social and Moral Reform branch of the church, asking that the pastors speak on political purity, and sacredness of the ballot. He would say that the pulpit was no place for party politics, but it was a place for the study of the great broad principles, laid down in the Word of God. This was an age of intense commercialism. There was great danger of people being unable to see anything else, but machinery, placing the value ticket on everything. These were days, when special reference was necessary along these lines. The great truth to learn, was that it did not matter what we had in this life, but it was what we are ourselves.

And in electing men for our parliament, we should elect able men, God fearing men, truthful men, men hating covetousness. The men who are elected to make up parliament, should be men who would measure up to the text. The men should be able men, of fine intelligence, and more than ordinary ability. A man who had no education, should not be chosen, as we could not afford to have figure heads. We should not elect a man who would blindly follow a leader. The man should be honest, and sincere, the same after an election, as before. It was a great thing to be a true man. Who could estimate the worth of such a man?

A man showing selfishness and greed should not be a representative. The man elected should be a man of broad liberal views. The speaker said he had been told last week, that in the coming Kingston election, money would be poured out like water. He did not know whether or this statement was true. The man who would allow himself to be bought in this way was a villain, and the same term applied to the man offering the money.

HARVEST SERVICES A STEAMER ASHORE

WENT ON AT CARLETON ISLAND BELOW CAPE VINCENT. Steamer Donnelly Left for Scene With Barge Grantham—Several Steamers Lightered Their Cargo of Grain in Kingston.

The steamer Sindh, owned by the Hall company, of Ottawa, ran aground at Carleton Island, below Cape Vincent, N.Y., on Sunday, and the Donnelly Wrecking company, of this city, was asked to render assistance.

The steamer Donnelly and the barge Grantham cleared for Cape Vincent on Monday morning at 8:30 o'clock.

The steamer Sindh was loaded with coal on her way from Erie, to Quebec.

The steamer Alexandria will arrive from Montreal, to-night, and will discharge freight at Folger's wharf.

The steamer Edmonton is on the way from Fort William with grain for Richardson's elevator.

The steamer Rosedale, grain-lader, from Fort William, lightered her cargo at Richardson's elevator, and cleared for Montreal.

The steamers McKinstry and Port Colborne passed down and the steamers Dundee and Gordon passed up.

The schooner Ford River arrived from Erie with coal for the Grove Inn.

M. T. Co.'s elevator: The tug Mary arrived from Montreal with oil barge No. 86 and barge Quebec; the tug Bartlett cleared with these barges for the Welland canal; the steamer Kenora, grain-lader, from Fort William, lightered her cargo of 7,000 bushels and cleared for Montreal; the steamer Stormont arrived at noon, grain-lader, from Fort William, lightered, and cleared for Montreal.

At Swift's wharf: Steamer Dundee passed up today with a heavy cargo of freight and discharged considerable steamer Rideau King cleared for Ottawa this morning; steamer Altha was down from bay ports to-day; the steamer Kingston made the river trip to-day; steamer North King made the river trip Sunday; steamer Lamonde went down to Gananoque to-day; the steamer Dundara passed down Sunday with considerable freight.

The government steamer Scout is in the Kingston dry-dock having some minor repairs made.

The steamer Airwyn, of Oswego, which was in the Kingston dry dock having some repairs made, cleared Saturday evening.
