WILL CARRY RECIPROcity.

Whole Middle West is in Favor of the Pact. J. T. Dodd, a traveller for an English house, who has just returned from a trip to the coast, told the Whig Tuesday that he believed the whole of the middle west provinces would carry reciprocity. "The people of all the western provinces, with the exception of British Columbia, are confident that by means of reciprocity they will be able to get their machinery much cheaper than they are getting it at the present time," he said. "To one who is starting in a small way on a homestead the decrease in the price of farm implements means much and for that reason I am sure they will all vote for the pact. The implement men in the west at the present time are squeezing all the money out of the farmers they can get," emphatically stated Mr. Dodd.

MORGAN WILL MAKE LOAN

If Germany Will Accept France's Moroccan Offer. New York, Sept. 19.—J. Pierpont Morgan, as an ambassador of peace, may become greater by far than President Taft. It has just developed that this United States financier, on being asked yesterday by German bankers interests for a big loan, promised to make it on condition that Germany accept the terms of France in the Moroccan controversy. The answer is not known yet.

Cheaper Food For Kingston As Result of Reciprocity

Do the people of Kingston realize that the party Mr. Nickle is supporting is in favor of allowing the packers and the canners to maintain their high prices at the expense of the poor consumer? Do the workmen and the wage earners of Kingston realize that they are paying far too much money for foodstuffs? Here are a few examples—

A Kingston wholesaler has received the September prices for certain produce. The Dominion Canners, Limited, of Hamilton, quote \$1.40 for tomatoes. The United States figure for the same article is just 50 cents. Look at the difference of sixty cents, or over eighty percent cheaper than the Canadian combine price.

The Canadian quotation for canned corn is \$1. The American quotation is 75 cents and 77 cents.

Salt is another article controlled by Canadian combines. The Canadian quotation for delivery in Kingston is \$2.71 as against \$1.75 on the other side of the line. In the Kingston district fully \$60,000 worth of canned goods is sold by the local wholesale houses every year. Does the Kingston workman and wage earner wish to receive lower prices? If he does he should strongly support reciprocity and vote for Mowat.

LAURIER CONFIDENT

That His Government Will be Sustained.

Sir Wilfrid was never so confident in his life as now that his government will score an overwhelming victory on September 21st. His conviction is shared by liberals in every part of Canada. Everywhere it is recognized that the conservative cause is lost. By bringing on a premature election, and by revealing itself as the tool of the "interests," the conservative party has made a blunder so grave and so far-reaching that it cannot recover from the ensuing loss and confusion for a decade at least. After September 21st the conservative party will require a new leader, in fact, a new set of leaders. It will be compelled to recognize, to call a national convention, as it should have done a year ago, and to set itself resolutely to work upon its own reformation.

ROORBACHS.

This week will see the usual crop of opposition roorbachs. The roorbach dodge, however, has been worked so often that voters of experience take day-before-election stories with a grain of salt. Misrepresentation has run riot in the Bordenite press during the present campaign, and may be expected to reach an unusual climax this week. The Borden-Bourassa alliance is causing the party a lot of trouble. Even the Telegram (Con.) admitted on Saturday that Monk and Bourassa are Mr. Borden's allies. So it is not unlikely that some one prominent in the Ontario wing of the party, perhaps Mr. Borden himself, will come out with a roorbach repudiation of Bourassa and his anti-imperialism in time to reach the Ontario electorate, but too late for circulation in Quebec.

But the time for successful repudiation has long since passed. The Borden candidates in Quebec are pledged to the Bourassa platform. Indeed, nationalists and conservatives in many constituencies have one candidate in common. The Quebec alliance is a fact which cannot now be repudiated by Mr. Borden unless he is willing to repudiate almost every conservative candidate in that province.
