

IS NOTHING TO FEAR

MANUFACTURERS SAY FACT WILL HELP THEM.

Goderich Men's Ringing Answer to Circular Issued From Conservative Headquarters of the Town—A Clear-cut Statement.

Goderich, Sept. 18.—The persistent efforts of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association and large minded interests of Canada to line up the manufacturers against reciprocity have received an emphatic refusal by the factory owners and operators of Goderich. A circular recently issued from the local conservative headquarters depicted disaster to all factories, and consequent lack of employment, for their men, if reciprocity is carried, to which the following unanimous denial has been issued by prominent manufacturers of various lines of staple goods:

To whom it may concern: We have seen the circular issued from the conservative committee rooms in this town, in which it is stated that the factories of Goderich will be so injuriously affected by the proposed reciprocity agreement that they may be compelled to close down, thus throwing out of employment all the men engaged thereon. We hereby declare that the adoption of the policy of reciprocity as proposed will not have any injurious effects upon our industries, but rather will help them by furthering the development of the western provinces and by increasing the general prosperity of the country. We deprecate any statements made for a partisan purpose, which are calculated to give our workmen needless anxiety.

A NUN THOUGHT DEAD SUDDENLY REVIVED

Preparations Were Made For Burial Aged Sister in Comatose Condition.

Rome, Sept. 19.—A despatch from Palermo contains an account of an extraordinary case of what amounted to premature burial. The officials at the local cemetery were informed that a nun named Serafina Lovardo, aged 72, had died during the night at the convent, and undertakers were at once sent to make the funeral arrangements. A doctor left for the convent at the same time to certify the death and prepare the usual formal certificate. Great was the surprise of the nuns, however, when the doctor, after a close examination, ordered the "corpse" to be removed immediately from the chapel ardente, saying that the aged lady was merely in a comatose condition, probably as the result of an epileptic seizure. All the preparations for the funeral, of course, were at once cancelled, and with suitable medical treatment the nun was soon restored to her normal condition. This event has naturally caused an immense sensation in the district.

CHILEANS ARE IN TERROR

Of American Band of Outlaws—Fear a Rescue.

Buenos Ayres, Sept. 19.—With the authorities holding Richard Perkins, one of an American band of outlaws, which has been terrorizing the Chilean frontier for ten years with robbery and murder, great fear is entertained that other members of the band will attempt to rescue him. Henry Longbaugh, known as "the sun dance kid," and who for years headed a gang of outlaws in the west, is the leader of the band here. The latest robbery attributed to the band is that of the bank at Villa Mercedes when \$12,000 was stolen. Longbaugh brought his entire band here ten years ago when they were chased from the states.

WORD TO WORKINGMEN

THOSE OPPOSING RECIPROCITY ARE HIS ENEMIES.

They Do Not Want Him to Get Cheaper Food—Laurier Offers the Working Classes a Boon.

Woodstock Sentinel-Review. The workingman who finds himself in doubt as to where his duty lies may help himself to a conclusion by considering who they are who are opposing the proposed reciprocity agreement and why.

Who are the men who have broken away from the liberal party, its policy and traditions? Are they the kind of men to whom the workingman would be likely to look for light and guidance? Men who count their yearly gains by the thousands, the tens of thousands and even the millions can afford to sneer at the efforts of the workingman to secure a reduction of a few cents here and there on various articles of his food. It does not matter very much to the millionaire whether the price of his food is a few cents higher or lower, whether the price of fruits or vegetables is kept within reach of the ordinary consumer the year round, or not. The millionaire's table will not want perhaps the luxuries with which the table is loaded will be rendered all the more palatable by a consideration of the fact that they are beyond the reach of the ordinary consumer. The millionaire can well afford to pay the high prices demanded; but the matter of even a few cents more or less in the price of food may be one of real importance to the workingman whose wife is compelled to keep track of every cent of both income and outlay.

Then, again, take the manufacturers who are opposing the reciprocity agreement. Not one of them, so far as we have been able to see, who do deal in food supplies, even if they take the ground that not yet the slightest measure of relief shall be granted to either the farmer who produces the food or to the workingman who exchanges his skill and his labor for the right to live.

The opposition of such manufacturers is utterly selfish, and, as is usually the case with selfishness, utterly short-sighted. Some of the most successful and most competent manufacturers in the country to-day are strongly supporting reciprocity, because they see that it will do them no harm, because they see that it is only a measure of fair play to others, and because they realize that in it and it will benefit their business by benefiting the country at large. They are able, moreover, to foresee that the proposed reciprocity agreement, instead of striking a blow at the protected industries, will really strengthen their position by disarming antagonism.

Again, there are among the opponents of reciprocity the professional politicians whose main object in life is to get into power by any means that offers itself. They are prepared to go back on everything that they ever advocated; they are prepared to resort to any kind of an argument that may help to catch a vote. They are prepared to use one kind of an argument in one community, and the opposite kind of an argument in another community. They ally themselves with men whom they detest and who detest them. The welfare of the workingman does not depend on the success of such a peculiar brand of statesmanship.

There are others who are opposing reciprocity because they sincerely believe it would not be a good thing for this country. Against these there is nothing worse to be said than that they may be mistaken. They are honest, and honorable men, even if mistaken, and worthy of respect. But not a great deal is heard from them. They are seeking to discuss the question on its merits, and for that reason receive scant support from men on their own side who, despairing of winning by an appeal to reason, are appealing to everything else but reason.

Monastir, Turkey, Sept. 19.—A mob led by a priest made an attack on the sanitary officers who are enforcing the regulations in regard to cholera. The sanitary commissioner was compelled to flee for his life. The mob got into his office, and the Valiev was forced to repeal some of the regulations of the sanitary authorities and to permit again the sale of fruit, the exercise of the rite of washing corpses and the re-opening of the contaminated water supply.
