**SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHERN LAND REGULATIONS.**

ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE HEAD OF A FAMILY OR ANY MALE OVER 18 YEARS OLD MAY HOMESTEAD A QUARTER SECTION OF LAND IN MANITOBA, SASKATCHEWAN, OR PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agent office and a homestead application may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother, or sister of intended homesteader.

DUTIES—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years; homestead may be within nine miles of a town or city or a farm of at least 50 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother, or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section of land for \$100 per acre, \$3000 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of three years from date of homestead entry (including time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra on the homestead which may be alienated right and cannot claim a pre-emption for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivate six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.



JEWISH CITIZEN TELLS

WHY HIS COMPATRIOTS SHOULD VOTE FOR MOWAT.

SIR WILFRID LAURIER HAS DONE WELL FOR CANADA—Borden's Ally, Bourassa Hates the Jews, and Has Said So.

Kingston, Sept. 19.—(To the Editor): Permit me, through your paper, to advance to the Jewish electors of this district, a few reasons why they should support the liberal party in the present campaign.

In the first place it is your duty, as Canadian citizens, to support the party which has brought to this country the prosperity which she is now enjoying. Canada is now, admittedly, one of the most flourishing countries in the world, and, moreover, has a future brighter than any other nation on the globe. But, only sixteen years ago it was a comparatively unknown and insignificant colony. Its population was small—about half of what it is today; its tremendous natural resources were undeveloped; its great west was uncultivated, and even the east was stagnant. Who brought about this transformation?

Who converted the weakly into such a giant?

The wise and progressive administration of the liberal party, with that great statesman, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, at its head. Now, I ask you, don't you think it is your duty to give a chance to continue to do the good work for the country?

If any one of you, in your private pursuits, had to engage someone to manage your business for you, would you not try to get a person with a good record if you possibly could?

The same method should be employed in choosing managers of the country's business. We have a chance of securing the services of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his party for the administration of the country's affairs. Should we not be only too glad to engage them again? Sir Wilfrid will now, and we should entrust him with the task of legislating for us so long as God gives him strength to work for his country.

One of the causes which contributed to the development of our country was the wise immigration policy of the liberal government. They have realized that the country's chief need was good, healthy people, and they tried to meet this need by encouraging the influx of immigrants to this country. They maintained agents abroad to boost this country and to attract settlers here and accorded fair treatment to those immigrants that came to our shores. The result was that Canada has been able to grow as she did. It looks like a very simple policy. But even this was opposed by the conservatives. At the time when the population of Canada only numbered about four million, the opponents of Sir Wilfrid Laurier raised the cry of "Canada for Canadians." Where would Canada have been to-day if this narrow-minded principle of building a Chinese wall around this fair country had been put into operation?

But you must not think that that incoming of immigrants would lower the standard of living here. That is not true. Both parties are too busy by depriving the Canadian merchants of their trades. Such a contingency is impossible, because, in the first place, the exporting of the products will not be done directly by the farmers, but will be carried on through the medium of produce merchants, and, in the second place, the duty on manufactured articles purchased on the other side will still remain. Bourassa Hates the Jews. Before concluding, I wish to point out one more fact, which deserves attention, viz.: the alliance of Borden with Bourassa. That this is a fact, no one will gainsay. Recently the Ottawa Journal, one of the leading conservative organs of the county published this fact, and has never retracted it. But do you realize the full import of this alliance?

Let me recall to you a little history. In 1895, when the whole civilized world was shocked at the news that hundreds of innocent Jews, aged hoary men, defenseless women and helpless children were being massacred, and butchered by the savages in Russia, Bourassa stood up on the floor of the Canadian House of Commons and expressed himself as delighted to hear such news. He'd like to hear, he said, that the Jews were treated in the same way everywhere. Can any man, who takes delight in such atrocities be human? Can we now give such a man, a share in the government of this fair, civilized country, of which we are all proud? Not only as Jews should we despise, and turn this man down in his quest of power, but as civilized human beings, we should exclaim "No! a man that revels on bloodshed cannot have a place of honor in a civilized community, we want human men!" good citizens here, just as you have done? I say, it is a duty which we cannot evade, and which we must bear in mind of the 21st of this month.

The Reciprocity Question. Now, let us, for a few moments, consider the reciprocity question. I cannot go into details, but please consider these facts:

Reciprocity is a piece of constructive statesmanship. Laurier has always been a constructive and progressive statesman, and his government has always been successful. Borden, on the other hand, has always been an adherent of the "let well enough alone" policy. He was afraid to go ahead, and is still afraid. He opposed every measure which Laurier has proposed, and all of which have subsequently, invariably proved boons to the country. If Borden had had his way whenever he opposed Laurier the present prosperity and all the progress which Canada can boast of would never have materialized. Laurier is the greatest statesman in Canada to-day. His name is recognized as one of the ablest men that ever served in a Canadian cabinet. Do you think that these men do not know what they are doing?

We know from experience that they have always proved to be right, and we can be quite confident that the bill of legislation at present under discussion, if carried, will add another link to their already long chain of successive achievements.

Reciprocity deals only with natural products. Note this. But what are the opponents telling us against it? They say it will hurt the manufacturing industries. How such a thing is possible only, these exceptionally brilliant logic can figure out. They are calling into play the annexation bogey. This, of course, is too absurd and too contemptible to merit much attention.
