A YOUNG MEN'S CLUB

WILL BE FORMED TO BOOM THE CITY.

Desire to Eliminate Politics From Municipal Affairs—Young Men Will be Placed in Field for City Council Honors.

A young men's club is about to be organized in the city. The object for the formation of the club, is to help Kingston grow, or perhaps a better name for the club would be that of the "The Boosters' Club," as it is to be formed for this reason, and this one reason alone. It is felt that every means possible, should be taken to make the old historic city go ahead, and this is the first start to be undertaken by the young men.

The cause was given a good start on Thursday night. After the election returns were announced, quite a large number of young men met together, buried politics for the time being, and made the preliminary plans for what will without doubt, be the making of the city.

It was definitely decided to organize a young men's club, which will have no politics, and which will have for its purpose, the keeping out of politics in municipal affairs. Members of both parties will be eligible for membership, and it is the intention to place young men in the field for members of the city council.

A public meeting of the young men of the city, will be called within a week or so, for the purpose of organizing the club, with officers, etc. A committee was appointed in regard to the matter, consisting of George Richardson, Elmer Davis, William Hart, Jr., Arthur Craig and Dr. C. A. Morrison.



"They're a grand invention," said an overworked mother yesterday. "I can't cook dinner and rock the baby at the same time. I used to just have to let the baby howl away. Now the clockwork cradle stops its crying."

"No kind of a cradle is good for a child," announces Dr. Gottfried Koehler, assistant health commissioner. "A cot is far better, and will eventually put the cradle out of use."

"I rock my babies myself," said Health Commissioner Young. "I at low no one else to have anything to do with the rocking of them."

Efforts of the city health department to drive self-rocking cradles out of use will be redoubled.
