WILL IT COME?

About the last appeal made to the electors by the Tory party was that in which they urged them to reject reciprocity because two years hence the democrats would be in power in the United States and they would open the markets to Canada with no consideration in return. The democrats may never again be in power in the United States, but the scheme worked.

THEY DID AVAIL.

The twelve reasons why loyal Canadians should vote against reciprocity, which were plastered all over the dominion, did the trick. The people—wisely or not time will tell—believed that the introduction of the pact would result in the destruction of the natural resources, put Canada in the clutches of the Americans, and affect the loyalty of the mother country. The average Canadian rejoices to be a part of the empire in which the dominion holds the crowning place.

KINGSTON GOES TORY.

Kingston has gone over to the conservative side, like many another former liberal constituency. When one reads over the list of the mighty who have fallen on the liberal side in this province, it is not at all surprising that John McDonald Mowat went down to defeat, and that William Edgar Nickle won the seat vacated by Hon. William Hart, and which has been liberal since the Tupper government was swept out in 1896.

Kingston is another of the many constituencies that have declared themselves opposed to reciprocity. The Limestone City does not want any closer commercial relations with the United States. As that was the issue upon which the liberal government went to the country, Mr. Mowat simply went down with the issue. Had not Mr. Mowat entered the fight unprepared, he would have given Mr. Nickle a closer fight, but it is evident that the anti-reciprocity candidate was destined to win the election here, even though his party newspaper, the Standard, strongly favored the trade pact.

In Frontenac, the farmers also voted at reciprocity, and re-elected Mr. Edwards by a large majority. The Tory cry was used with a good deal of effect in the county to counteract any possible move towards reciprocity. Mr. Fair made a good fight as a straight reciprocity candidate, but the farmers preferred a doctor as their representative and the present trade conditions.

THE CONSERVATIVE SWEEP.

Hon. J. L. Borden and the conservative party came into power as a result of Thursday's election; all evidences point to a majority in their favor of about fifty. The anti-reciprocity views swept the country, the flag-waving having stirred the loyal sentiments of the people.

It was an overwhelming defeat of the liberal party, and was, to a great extent, a repetition of the landslide in 1896, which swept the conservative party out of office.

It is to be regretted that the reciprocity pact should have been so unceremoniously pitched overboard because even conservatives admit that as a business proposition it assuredly would be beneficial to both countries, but as all economic questions take a long time to absorb and fill the public mind the hard representations of the conservatives impressed themselves upon the masses and the defeat of the pact has been the result. Women had a large influence, even though they had no votes in the matter. They became impressed with the idea that the passage of the agreement meant an increased cost in living and the burdens already imposed upon them, in that respect, were sufficient and almost all that they could stand. The result was that the men capitulated to the dominant forces, those who were providers to the family comfort.

It is an interesting feature that Mr. Borden will meet in the house a very large representation of new men. As one looks over the list it is remarkable the number of old members who have either been defeated or were not in the fight.

The sweep of the cabinet ministers in the Laurier administration was simply amazing. Hon. W. S. Fielding and W. Paterson, the makers of the pact, went down before the onslaught of ballots. The Hon. Sydney Fisher, the agricultural minister, Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, minister of labor, Hon. G. P. Graham, the minister of railways and canals, Sir F. Borden, the minister of militia, and Hon. Frederick Bureau, the solicitor-general, are among the slain.

Hon. J. L. Borden, the conservative leader, according to records, had an exceedingly close shave in Halifax, winning only by twenty-five votes.

Although it was a remarkable landslide and is so complete that the liberal party can only smilingly take its defeat and bow to the decision of the people that, just now, reciprocity is not the thing they wish to have in this country. Reciprocity, however, is by no means dead and it will come up, possibly in some other form. The men on both sides of the line are growing more and more to believe that in natural products the two countries should have a fair exchange.

It is evident that the conservatives will be able to control parliament without the nationalists, or other sections, so that no entangling alliances will be necessary. The coming premier, has a herculean task before him but we trust he will perform it to the advantage of Canada.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

When Mowat called at the Standard on Thursday night, and in the presence of the crowd, shook hands with Nickle, he cemented friendships and created good fellowships that will bring Kingstonians together again.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON WHO IS THE HEAD of a family or who has over 18 years old must head a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of interested homesteader.

Under the month's residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 20 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section along with his homestead. Price, \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to secure homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price, \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
