### KINGSTON'S ELECTION

W. F. NICKLE ELECTED BY 343 MAJORITY.

The Remarks by the Two Candidates—Receiving the Returns—The Whig Showed the Results on a Large Screen.

The election of William F. Nickle, as member for Kingston, by a majority of 343 caused surprise in both political camps. While the conservative promised a victory, they did not figure upon such a large majority. A much closer contest was expected by both sides, and throughout the day it was scarcely possible to get a definite estimate of the probable result. Mr. Mowat, the liberal candidate, went down with reciprocity. The cry of the old flag assisted in his defeat, for flag-waving generally proves quite a factor in the election.

Mr. Nickle has won a seat which has gone liberal for the past fifteen years, or during four general elections for the dominion house. J. H. Metcalfe was the last conservative to sit for Kingston at Ottawa, he winning a bye-election in 1892 against the late Alexander Gunn, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the premier, Sir John A. Macdonald.

As usual there was a large crowd in front of the Whig office to watch the returns bulletined after five o'clock. The first figures came from Victoria ward about 5.12 o'clock, showing a small majority for Nickle. For a while, the figures were pretty even, but gradually Mr. Nickle began to forge ahead, and at 5.30 o'clock, the liberals knew that the day was against them.

It was plainly evident that the laboring classes had voted against reciprocity, this being seen by the large majorities for Mr. Nickle in Frontenac and Rideau wards. One surprise was the result in Sydenham ward, which has gone liberal for the past eighteen years, but which was carried this time by the conservative candidate by seven votes. St. Lawrence ward, Cataragui ward and Portsmouth, were the only places which Mr. Mowat won. Portsmouth certainly stood for reciprocity, giving Mowat the largest majority accorded a liberal candidate since 1904.

Mr. Nickle won the seat by practically the same majority as Hon. William Hartly secured over Dr. Ross in 1908. The Whig received the returns with great rapidity, having an excellent messenger boy service. The result was that the Whig bulletin was on the street at six o'clock.

#### The Defeated Candidate.

When it was seen that the conservative candidate had won the election, Mr. Mowat, who received the returns in the Whig office, addressed the large crowd gathered around him. The liberal standard-bearer was warmly cheered, as he mounted a chair, bowing and smiling the Mowat smile that will not come off. The defeated candidate proved himself a game fighter and a game loser, and his supporters were proud of him.

After the cheering had subsided, Mr. Mowat addressed the gathering briefly. He said he was sorry to be beaten, but he wished to say that he was still a worker with the rank and file of the good, old liberal party. He was satisfied.

#### RETURNS AT THE WHIG.

The Results Were Thrown Upon a Large Screen.

Hundreds of people stood on the sidewalks and market square to watch the election returns thrown on a screen in front of the Whig office from 6.30 o'clock until midnight. The rain showers were not enough to diminish the interest of the large crowd, although probably the returns did not quite suit the large majority.

The returns were furnished by the G.N.W., and the lantern slides were operated for the Whig by Dr. E. J. Lake, from a window in the Hub hotel. From the very start it was seen that the government was in danger of defeat, and as the returns continued to be thrown upon the screen the result of the day's voting throughout the dominion became very apparent. The continued announcements of the defeat of cabinet ministers did not draw forth the same kind of feelings as they have in the city hall. On all sides, however, regret was expressed at the defeat of Hon. George P. Graham, in the Brockville riding, and also of Hon. W. S. Fielding in Nova Scotia. Both of these cabinet ministers are revered by conservatives. Kingston is interested in Hon. Mr. Fielding because of the fact that his sister-in-law resides here.

It was nearly midnight when the service was discontinued but at that hour there was still a crowd to watch the Whig returns, which were thrown on the screen so that all could see and digest. At intervals Dr. Lake threw pictures of prominent citizens and well-known local scenes on the screen. Everybody appreciated the open-air service that the Whig provided.

#### Late Election Notes.

Contrary to expectations the election Thursday did not kill business the way it has other years and the stores had their usual run of trade. Business was brisk Friday morning also, as there were large numbers of people in town.

The principal topic of conversation on the street corners, in the stores, on the street cars, everywhere, in fact, was the complete landslide of the liberal majority. The majority exceeded even the most sanguine hopes of the conservative party.

The Whig issued an extra at 7 a.m. Friday, giving the results of the elections throughout the country. As usual the Whig led in this respect. Newsboys were calling the Whig extra for sale as the workmen were on their way to their duties. The Whig also led in the publication of an extra on Thursday evening with regard to the election in the city. It made record time, the extra being on the street before six o'clock.

#### THE FRONTENAC ELECTION.

Dr. Edwards Had an Easy Win Over R. H. Fair.

Although all the returns were not available Friday morning, an estimate places the majority of Dr. J. W. Edwards, over R. H. Fair, at over 600, with a possibility of it going much higher, when all the returns have been sent in.

That Wolfe Island was in favor of reciprocity was shown by the fact that Mr. Fair was given a majority of forty-four votes on the island. Mr. Fair had a majority in every sub-division. The total for the island was Dr. Edwards, 132; Mr. Fair, 206. No. 1 sub-division in Howe Island, gave Mr. Fair, a majority of 36. The rest of the county went pretty well for Edwards.

#### Married at Deseronto.

Deseronto Post. A very quiet wedding took place at the Church of St. Vincent de Paul, Deseronto, on September 19th, when James Shaw led to the altar Miss May Walsh, one of our most respected young ladies. The bridesmaid was Miss Annie Gough, and the best man was J. P. McCullough, both of Rosedale. The bride was very becomingly attired in champagne silk, while the bridesmaid was similarly attired. A large number of handsome presents showed the esteem in which the contracting parties were held, among which was a cheque from the bride's father. The groom's gift to the bride was a cheque, to the bridesmaid a ring, and to the best man a stick pin.

#### Fined and Bonded.

Albans Reporter. Last week a difference of opinion arose between W. H. Hanson and William Crozier as to certain territorial rights at Charleston Lake. Crozier claimed the right to monopolize the duck-shooting privileges of certain bay and when Hanson's party entered his preserve he proceeded to enforce his claim by hurling rocks at the invaders. For this offence he was taken to Brockville and fined and placed under bonds to keep the peace.

### ROSEDALE RELEASED

BUT STEAMER PELLATT IS STILL AGROUND.

Reported to be in a Very Dangerous Condition—Water is Still Low in Lower Canals—Marine Notes of Interest.

The steamer Rosedale, which went aground in Lachine Lake, has been released, undamaged. The vessel was not in very bad shape, thus there was very little trouble.

The steamer Pellatt is still aground near Incoquois and it is reported that she is in very bad shape. Both the Donnelly Wrecking company and the Calvert company are at work on her.

The steamer Marshall loaded with stone, at the penitentiary, and cleared for Toronto to-day.

The tug Emerson arrived from Montreal with three light barges, cleared for the Welland canal to lead grain at Port Colborne; the tug Bronson arrived from Montreal, with one barge of pulpwood and two light barges; the steamer Beaverton, grain-laden, from Fort William, lightered here, cargo and cleared for Montreal.

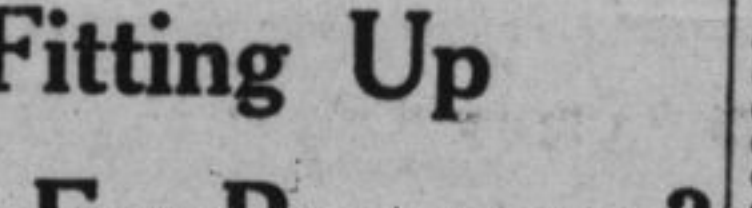
The water is still very low in the lower canals and is giving a great deal of trouble. A marine man stated to-day that he thought the water was getting lower than ever.
