Laurier Undismayed

HE SPOKE IN QUEBEC EAST ON THE RESULT.

The Veteran Premier Held His Head High—He Received a Magnificent Ovation.

Quebec, Sept. 22.—It was in Quebec East, at St. Peter's Market, where Sir Wilfrid Laurier has been elected continuously during the past thirty-four years, that he chose as the place for making his announcement when the returns last night showed that an opposition victory was practically assured, and that the country had expressed itself opposed to reciprocal commercial relations with the United States.

Quebec East has stood faithfully by Sir Wilfrid, and even this time, when results have been so adverse, Quebec East has returned Laurier by acclamation. The same old voters rallied about him to-night, cheering him as he drove through the streets to St. Peter's Market, where a large crowd awaited to hear him speak.

It was a hard blow to the premier, but he held his head high and at no time did he show any trace of emotion. He spoke with his old-time vigor, and his electors responded with unabated enthusiasm.

After a most striking ovation Sir Wilfrid, addressing the crowd, said that the return, while not complete, were yet complete enough to show that victory had after years abandoned the liberal banner. "What consoles me in this," said Sir Wilfrid, "is to know that the province of Quebec has remained faithful." He had nothing with which to reproach himself, except for the defeat of his colleagues.

The tory-nationalist alliance had been too strong, but the liberal party, though defeated, could still hold its head up and march on to honor and future victory.

Canada's relations with the United States had always been cordial and he did not know what effect the liberal defeat would have on those relations. His heart beat as strongly as ever, and he could still hold his head high. The liberal party had been checked, but could still go on with its work without losing heart.

Continuing Sir Wilfrid said: "If I were twenty years younger I would still be in the breach, but I cannot say now what my course for the future will be."

Sir Wilfrid then thanked his electors of Quebec East for their staunch support, and was greeted with cheers. He had led his party for nearly a score of years and he had nothing to blush for. He had followed a high and honorable course; his party had received a check, but it would come back again.

Sir Wilfrid returns to Ottawa tomorrow.
