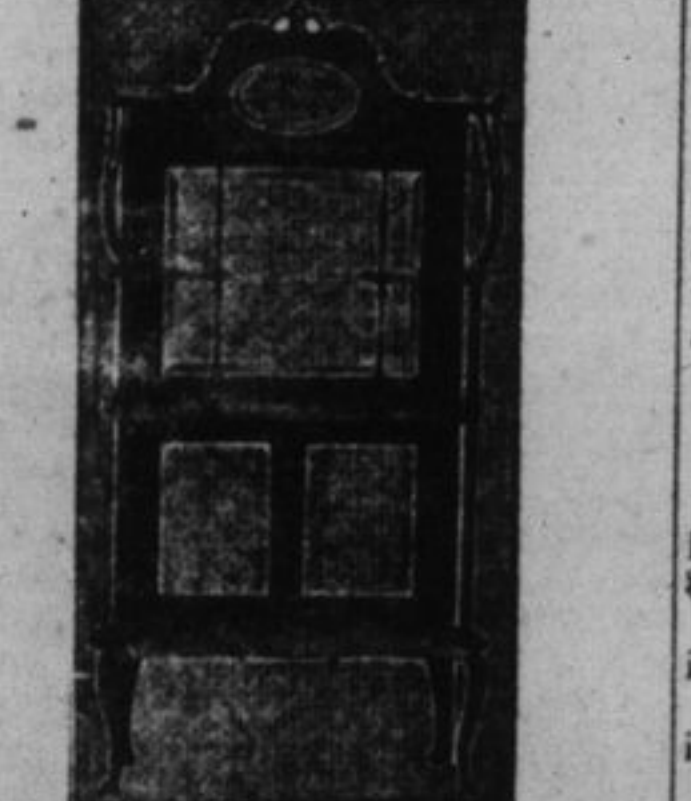

Price Took Quite a Drop on Saturday Morning.

Cheese took quite a drop on the Frontenac board, on Saturday morning, the meeting being held on Saturday as the elections were held on Thursday, the regular day for the meeting. Cheese sold at 13 1/2-16c, while a week ago, it sold at 14 7/16c. There was boarded 205 boxes of white cheese and 375 boxes of colored. These factories boarded:

White—Glenburnie, 50; Latimer, 60; Wolfe Island, 60; Frontenac, 35; total, 205.

Colored—Batterssea, 90; Excelsior, 35; Glenvale, 50; Sand Hill, 35; Silver Springs, 30; McGrath's, 30; Mountain Grove, 30; Elmdale, 25; total, 375.

At 13 1/2-16c., Mr. Murphy bought Batterssea, Excelsior, Sand Hill, Silver Springs, McGrath's, Wolfe Island. At the same price, Mr. Gibson bought Glenburnie, Glenvale, Latimer, and Frontenac, and at the same figure, Mr. Thomson secured Mountain Grove and Elmdale.
