OUR ABORIGINE RECORD

CANADA HAS DONE REMARKABLE FEATS WITH INDIANS.

For a Country Overrun With Native Peoples Canada Has Had a Wonderfully Small Number of Wars and Credit is Chiefly Due to the Mounted Police—The Red Men Today is Learning to Till the Soil.

Long ago our Indians ceased to be warriors, and when that change took place the light of life went out for many a Redman. For to most of us the purpose of existence was to slay one's enemies, who, as a rule, consisted of all the world except the members of one's own tribe.

It has been one of the boasts of the Government of Canada that since they took over the West their endeavor has been to secure through out that vast region peace and safety.

For that peace and safety credit must be given to that small but most efficient and faithful band of men composing the Royal Northwest Mounted Police that, throughout all that vast region from the International Boundary, even to the shores of the Arctic Ocean, represents the majesty of the law and makes life and property secure.

It was organized in 1873, and at first consisted of only 150 men. It was increased slowly as conditions required and means for its maintenance were available; but it is still small, for according to a late official report, it now consists of only 31 officers, 600 non-commissioned officers and constables, with 258 horses.

Where now are the conquering Blackfoot and their allies, and where too are their hereditary enemies, the Cree and the Assiniboines, who suffered so severely in that last big Indian battle on Canadian soil, more than forty years ago?

The Blackfoot reside upon a reserve with an area of 470 square miles, situated just south of the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway, about fifty miles east of Calgary. In describing their industrial progress a late report on Indian affairs states: "These Indians' facilities for earning money are numerous and increasing rapidly both on and off the reserve."

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Such a large number are semi-self supporting. The Polgan reserve is on the Oldman River west of M'Leod, and it contains 116,000 acres occupied by 500 Indians. They too are going in for farming, especially the younger generation.

The Crees are settled on small reserves scattered throughout Saskatchewan and Alberta, and are often to be found mixed with other tribes, notably the Saulteaux.

The Assiniboines, also known as the Stonies, are on a reserve, 72 square miles in area, situated nine miles south of Sinitulata, on the C.P.R., in the Province of Saskatchewan.

In speaking of these Indians a department officer writes: "The majority of these Indians are engaged in grain-growing and stock raising. Some of the young men hire as laborers for settlers, others are employed in tanning hides, while a few are engaged in hunting and trapping during the winter months."

Some time ago the Parks Department got a grizzly from the United States Government, and the pair of them were worth \$800. Toronto got them for the cost of bringing them back.

GEORGHAN BAY NAMES.

Admiral Bayfield Fixed the Most Prominent Ones.

In these heated days when thousands of Ontarians are flocking to summer resorts on Georgian Bay and Muskoka to escape Old Sol's scorching rays, it is interesting to note the wily and wherefore of the many names, picturesque and otherwise, which are met with in that vicinity.

A most interesting paper on this subject was read by Mr. James V. Hill, secretary of the Commercial Club, at a session, before the recent annual gathering in Brantford of the Ontario Historical Society, of which Mr. D. Williams, of Collingwood is president.

Place-names in this area can be assigned to three distinct periods: First, those given by Bayfield when he surveyed it in 1822; second, the local names given by fishermen, residents, and others between the date of Bayfield's survey and 1883; third, the new survey by Messrs. Boulton and Stewart in 1883-93.

In 1822 Robert Saunders Dundas, second Viscount Melville, Sir William Johnstone Hope, Sir George Cockburn, and William Robert Keith Douglas were Lord High Admirals, hence Cape Dundas, Melville Sound, Hope Bay and Islands, Cockburn Island and Point, and Douglas Bay and Point.

As there was a considerable naval establishment on the Great Lakes, Bayfield named a number of structures after naval officers, James Lucas and Yeo Islands and Cape Commodore, after Sir James Lucas Yeo, Commander-in-Chief on the Great Lakes, 1814; Barrie Island after Capt. Robt. Barrie, acting commissioner of the navy at Kingston; Bushby, Inlet, Boucher Point and Basin, Walsby Bay, Criel Island, and Thompson Point are named after officers of the royal navy serving on the Great Lakes.

Sandy to Stay Out. The Conservatives of Charlottetown tried hard to get "Sandy" Martin into harness again, but the genial Scot, who once electrified the House by saying a speech of half an hour in Gaelic, which completely put Hansard out of business, and nearly caused a free fight in the French-Canadian ranks, has definitely declined the honor of being the running mate of his former colleague, Angus McLean.

Lord Hugh Cecil, who figured so unpopularity in the recent Parliamentary election, is the youngest and most distinguished son of the late Marquess of Salisbury. He is a brilliant debater, although when he first commences to speak he seems to suffer from extreme nervousness.

Aliens in Medieval Times. Medieval England had a rough and ready way of insuring the good behavior of aliens. According to the Saxons on law of frankpledge, which remained in force until 1370, no "foreigner" might entertain a foreigner longer than a day and a night unless he undertook to answer for his guest's behavior.

Enter the Parsees. Dr. R.P. Ghadiali, a Parsee, who is proprietor of Indian journal Imperialist, is outspoken when discussing Canadian immigration laws and their relation to Hindu immigration.

To Make Clay Roads Mudless. It is reported that an invention for the improvement of clay roads, has been submitted to the Canadian Department of Agriculture, and if the inventor's claims are justified it will be of immense benefit to farmers who live in a clay belt and all who have business with them that necessitates traveling over the muddy roads in the autumn and the spring.

Novia Scotia's Banks. Nova Scotia has one bank to every 1,000 inhabitants. Obediah Gardner, of Rockland, was appointed United States senator, to succeed the late Senator William F. Frye.

Robert G. Fowler, the aviator, failed in his attempt to scale the Sierras. The mountain winds beat him back.

A big demonstration to Robert L. Borden is being arranged in Ottawa, probably on Tuesday evening.

THE GREAT SEAL.

Precious Symbol of Office Has Had Many Adventures.

No other emblem of Governmental authority, perhaps, ever had such a series of queer adventures as those pertaining to the Great Seal of England.

In the first place, says Harper's Weekly, when Richard I. set out for the Holy Land he took the seal with him. His vice-chancellor, Mattheus, is said to have worn it suspended by a chain around his neck, and the Cyprus cross-shaped seal itself, which was used, and the great seal was lost.

The first seal of Charles I. was thrown into the River Severn, in order that it might not fall into the hands of "oppressed" subjects. When James II. fled from England he carried the great seal with him. He threw it into the Thames, evidently thinking that, without it, William III. could not claim the government.

The great seal of England is often called "the seals," because it is made in two parts, the obverse and the reverse. In other days when a new seal was used it was broken into pieces, the destruction forming quite a ceremonious act. The pieces were a requisite of the chancellor. In modern days the ceremony of breaking the old seal has consisted in the sovereign's giving it a gentle blow with a hammer.

According to an article in the London Times, the relatives of the late Boyd Alexander are about to present, in accordance with the wishes of the deceased, his large collection of African birds to the British Museum. The specimens are about 4,000 in number and include several species (whether the types is not stated) discovered by the late explorer, among the most interesting of these being Wilcock's honeyguide (indicator wilcockii) and the long-tailed tree-warbler (trochiloides mariae), the latter representing a generic type of its own.

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LEADERS IN STRIKE.

English Labor Chieftains Are a High-Class Group.

On Messrs. Gosling, Spicer & Tillet falls the chief burden of the fight, says The London Telegraph, and, with the exception of the latter, they are men who do not resemble in the least the loud-roared, beetle-browed agitator and mad leader of this type pictured in the public mind.

Tillet is a picturesque figure, short and sturdy, broad-shouldered and deep chested, with a pale, clean-shaven face, cast in a Napoleonic mould, and a broad forehead, overhung with long black hair. He is the most powerful and fiery speaker in the movement, and no one knows better than he how to sway an audience of workmen.

James Spicer is another fine organizer. A good speaker, but not of the militant type. To him come all the multi-made jobs that require more or less immediate decision, and he has probably more worry and harassing than any of his colleagues.

There are the men who control the strikers, and every one of them is anxious that the dispute should be carried on without violence. Their efforts to maintain order and discipline in their varied army have not met with complete success, but this is not the fault of the leaders, whose every speech is an exhortation for peace and discipline.
